PRESIDENT Hakainde Hichilema says he is humbled by his party's decision to have him as the presidential candidate in the August 13 general election. This was after he went through unopposed during nominations at the UPND secretariat – Anderson Kambela Mazoka – in Lusaka yesterday. Mr Hichilema said the nomination is a collective victory for the party and the people of Zambia, who he pledged to tirelessly work for in an effort to better their livelihoods. "...the nominations closed and this fellow speaking here

has been nominated unopposed and I am so grateful. I am truly humbled for this gesture and I can only thank God for guiding us through the intra-party elections," Mr Hichilema, who was received by hundreds of UPND sympathisers, said amid applause.

The President, accompanied by First Lady Mutinta, was received to a thunderous welcome by scores of UPND members, who chanted 'Salt saana!' "The multitudes that have come outside there are a humbling indication that the people of Zambia are agreed that the UPND is their vehicle to deliver development, to deliver buyantanshi, to deliver chitukuko, to deliver bukomo," the President said.

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HH to open Mulungushi Textiles Thursday

PRESIDENT Hakainde Hichilema is this Thursday expected to reopen the US\$140 million Zambia-China Mulungushi Textiles in Kabwe, a landmark development set to create over 500 jobs and empower over 2,500 cotton farmers.

Minister of Commerce, Trade and Industry Chipoka Mulenga announced the development during the ground-breaking for the Zambia Petrochemical Energy Company Limited (ZPEC) refinery in Ndola. Mr Mulenga said the reopening of the textile company marks a significant milestone in Zambia's industrialisation agenda and

underscores Government's commitment to job creation and economic transformation. "I wish to invite the provincial minister for the Copperbelt to note that on the 16th of this month, His Excellency, the President, will launch the reopening of Mulungushi Textiles. "This project represents an investment of over US\$140

million, undertaken in partnership with our long-standing and reliable friends, the Government of the People's Republic of China," he said. Mr Mulenga said the revitalisation of the textile giant will have far-reaching benefits across the value chain. "Through this initiative, more than 2,500 new cotton farmers have been engaged,

supported by dedicated extension officers. The installation of brand new equipment is expected to create over 500 jobs, further stimulating economic growth and empowering local communities," he said. The giant factory comes back to life after two decades of dormancy and neglect.

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Jito urges men to hold up ladder for women

SPECIAL Assistant to the President for Finance and Investment Jito Kayumba has called on men to actively support and mentor women aspiring to leadership roles, highlighting the importance of inclusive decision-making.

Speaking during the When Females Lead (WFL) fundraising gala dinner, Mr Kayumba said women continue to play a critical role in governance and national development.

"As men, we will be there as allies to mentor and support you. You can count on us, not only in my current role, but even when I return to the private sector,

every endeavour I am involved in will have a significant presence of women," he said.

Mr Kayumba highlighted efforts by President Hakainde Hichilema to promote inclusivity, noting progress in appointing women to key positions, such as vice-president and speaker of the National Assembly.

Mr Kayumba acknowledged that barriers to women's advancement still exist but stressed his personal commitment to ensuring women are included in leadership spaces.

LAWYER and lecturer Arnold Kaluba has been elected as Law Association of Zambia (LAZ) president, after pledging to foster unity and a member-centred leadership during campaigns. The new Kaluba-led LAZ council was ushered in following the successful conclusion of the 2026 annual general meeting and elections held in Livingstone on Saturday. Mr Kaluba, who replaces Lungisani Zulu, pledges to continue strengthening LAZ, empowering its members, and advancing the legal profession in Zambia. The Rhodes scholar and managing partner at Arnold Kaluba and Associates was successfully elected after polling over 1,000 votes. During campaigns ahead of the general assembly, Mr Kaluba had pledged to

strengthen the council's leadership through unity of purpose.

Mr Kaluba will be deputised by Sonia Shamwana, the newly elected vice-president. Misozi Masengu takes up the role of honorary secretary, while Womba Kankondo continues as honorary treasurer.

The newly elected council members are Mehluhi Batakathi, Limose Tembo-Tindi, Francis Daka, Mulenga Sholomo, Mary Mwansa, Tifwepo Musukwa, Kennedy Mambwe, John Ngisi, Chibeleka Nkobali, Timmy Munalula, Makesa Kalifungwa and Njavwa Sinkamba.

Mobile money now at toll gates

THE National Road Fund Agency (NRFA) has introduced mobile money payment options to provide motorists with a flexible and convenient way of settling fees at toll gates operated by the agency countrywide.

The initiative is part of the digital transformation aimed at speeding up transactions and reducing cash-related risks.

In a statement yesterday, NRFA public relations manager Alphonsius Hamachila said the digital payment system will operate alongside existing traditional payment methods like E-toll card and cash. Motorists will now have three easy and accessible ways to settle toll charges, helping to reduce localised congestion, improve traffic flow and enhance overall customer convenience.

Mr Hamachila, however, said the payment initiative will not be applicable at public-private partnership (PPP)-operated toll gates. And NRFA information and communications technology (ICT) manager Mumba Mubili said adoption of mobile money is part of the agency's ongoing digital transformation agenda aimed at making toll payments more efficient and user-friendly. He said NRFA is committed to leveraging technology to modernise toll operations and strengthen revenue collection for the construction, rehabilitation and maintenance of the national road network. Several motorists have described the new payment mode as secure and faster.

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Leadership anchor of peace

THE peace that we are enjoying ahead of the elections is not by chance. It is the result of steady leadership, especially from President Hakainde Hichilema, whose style of governance has promoted peace, tolerance and stability. This is an example of how leadership can shape the future of a nation.

As Caroline Katotbwe, executive director of Centre for Sustainable Democracy and Governance (CSDG), said, leadership is the key factor: when leadership is good, calmness follows; when leadership is poor, chaos and lawlessness take over. This truth is clear when we compare today's environment with past elections, which were often full of disorder and intimidation.

In 2021, elections were marked by unruly behaviour, especially from ruling party supporters. Streets became a battlefield. Citizens often felt unsafe expressing their political views.

Today, however, the story is different. People can wear party regalia freely, attend rallies without fear, and speak openly. This is a result of sound leadership.

As Ms Katotbwe said, President Hichilema's leadership has been "top-notch" because it has restored the rule of law. Sanity has returned as a pillar of national development.

Peace is not only about the absence of violence; it is about justice, fairness, and respect for rights. By showing dislike for disorder, the President has set the tone for a political culture that values dialogue over confrontation.

Citizens can now participate freely in political life without harassment. This is the Zambia people have long wanted – a nation where democracy is not just spoken about, but lived.

Election periods are always a test for leadership. They show whether leaders can manage tensions, guide supporters, and

uphold the law. In this test, Zambia's leadership has shown maturity. The calmness we see today proves that leadership is not about words alone; it is about action and consistency.

As Ms Katotbwe said, those who try to disrupt peace must face the full force of the law. Peace must be protected, and leadership must remain watchful.

As Arthur Muyumba, executive director of the Southern African Centre for the Constructive Resolution of Disputes (SACCORD), said, this peace the country is enjoying reflects citizens' reduced fear of violence compared to past elections. This is a sign of better governance practices. When citizens feel safe, they are more likely to take part in democracy, which strengthens elections.

Mr Muyumba also said bad practices such as hate speech must not be allowed to take hold. Leadership must continue to guard against such divisive behaviour, ensuring elections remain a contest of ideas, not insults.

The peaceful environment also improves Zambia's image abroad. A country that can hold elections peacefully earns respect and trust from the world. Investors, partners and neighbours see Zambia as a nation that values stability. This reputation is built through consistent leadership that puts peace first.

Peace is the foundation of national development. Without peace, progress stops. With peace, education, health and economic growth can thrive. Leadership that ensures calm elections is leadership that opens the door to prosperity.

Zambia is indeed now witnessing freedom where citizens can express themselves without fear. This is leadership in action, showing that democracy can grow when guided by respect for the rule of law.

Chinganya leads global statistics institute

Musokotwane says election moment of pride for Africa

ZAMBIA has earned global recognition after Zambia Statistics Agency (ZamStats) board chairperson Oliver Chinganya got elected as president of the International Statistical Institute (ISI).

Dr Chinganya will serve as president-elect from next year to 2029 before assuming the presidency from 2029 to 2031.

In a statement yesterday, Minister of Finance and National Planning Situmbeko Musokotwane congratulated Dr Chinganya on the achievement, stating that the election is a proud moment for Zambia and Africa.

"This election is a moment of pride not only for Zambia, but for the

African continent more broadly," he said.

He added: "It speaks to the growing weight of African expertise in global statistical governance and reflects Zambia's rising contribution to evidence-based policy-making, public sector leadership and international development discourse."

Dr Musokotwane said the election demonstrates the confidence the international community has in Zambian professionals and underscores the country's growing influence in global knowledge platforms.

"Dr Chinganya's election is a strong signal of the confidence the international community places in Zambian professionals. The election affirms that Zambia is not only participating in global knowledge platforms, but increasingly helping to shape them," Dr Musokotwane said.

He said credible statistics are indispensable to sound economic management, national planning, investment promotion and the monitoring of development outcomes.

The minister has also congratulated other officials and council members elected from Canada, the United States, Chile, Italy, Brazil, Portugal, Taiwan, India and China, noting that their selection reflects the international and collaborative character of the Institute.

Dr Musokotwane expressed confidence that Dr Chinganya will serve with excellence and continue to bring honour to Zambia and inspiration to statisticians across Africa and beyond.

Dr Chinganya's distinguished career includes serving as chief statistician at the United Nations Economic Commission for Africa and holding key international advisory roles.

Victoria Falls site to get facelift - Sikumba

MINISTER of Tourism Rodney Sikumba says Government plans to improve the outlook and visitors' experience around the Victoria Falls heritage site, while appreciating the surge in tourist numbers during the first quarter.

Mr Sikumba said plans are underway to enhance the entire visitors' journey from the outlook tree, a large baobab tree with a platform that offers tourists a vantage view of the falls from about a kilometre away.

"People just walk in and walk out; that is not supposed to be the case. We need to have a situation where the information centre reflects what visitors should anticipate," he said yesterday after getting drenched by the waterfall's spray and checking the safety of the recently installed barricades at the falls.

He said Livingstone's identity must be visible to tourists, the media, the community and Zambians alike.

The minister said his ministry is prioritising safety, hygiene and site management following the completion of new barricades along the viewing areas.

"I took the liberty of walking through the entire stretch of the barricade, and people have to appreciate the things we have to do," he said.

Mr Sikumba also thanked domestic and international visitors to the tourist capital.

"The traffic that we have seen in the first quarter of 2026 is unprecedented. But that does not happen by chance... it is all orchestrated, and fortunately God has given us rains," he said of the dramatic curtains of water that have added to the site's appeal.

Over 10,000 visits to Victoria Falls were recorded during the Easter holiday.

National Heritage Conservation Commission executive director Kagosi Mwamulowe said the Victoria Falls has the largest curtain of falling water in the world and deserves enhanced conservation and presentation.

Kabwe clergy says unity in diversity critical

KABWE Diocese Cathedral of the Sacred Heart of Jesus assistant priest John Mutale says unity in diversity is critical in upholding peace and promoting national development.

Father Mutale says unity is one of the marks of true Christianity

because Jesus emphasises the importance of oneness among people who follow Him.

He noted that when people of God are united, individuals who are not Christians will not succeed in separating them.

Fr Mutale said this yesterday in a homily during the Divine Mercy Sunday.

He said there is no need

for any individual or group to prioritise regionalism above national unity, love, peace and the mercy of God.

"And when we divide ourselves on tribal lines, it will be difficult for some of us because we will not know where we should go," he said.

"This Fr John who was born here in Kabwe, I am partly from

Northern (Province), partly from Eastern (Province), but I am Lenje, but if you chase me to Eastern Province, they chase because I don't know how to speak Chewa."

Fr Mutale said children of God should not be pulling in opposite directions or conduct themselves in a manner that causes division.

"And people will see Christ in us if there is unity among us, but if there is no unity among us, it will be difficult for people to know that Jesus has risen from the dead because Christ has given us the work of evangelising and how are we going to teach if there is no love among us?" he wondered.

Fr Mutale said people who are

alive should be grateful to God because it is at His mercy.

"One finger can't kill a louse and Jesus Christ is also telling us that where two of three are gathered, I am there."

Fr Mutale said the resurrection of Jesus from the dead should be a reminder for individuals who believe in Him that there is hope and life.

3 die in Kapiri as minibus overturns

THREE people have died while 15 others sustained serious injuries in a road traffic accident which happened on the Great North Road in Kapiri Mposhi, Central Province.

The mishap happened on Saturday in an area called Luanshumba when the driver of a minibus carrying 18 passengers heading to Kabwe veered off the road and overturned.

Police spokesperson Godfrey Chilabi said in a statement

yesterday that the incident happened around 09:00 hours.

The accident involved a Nissan Caravan minibus registration number CAK 4236ZM, a public service vehicle driven by Watson Siliho, 36, of Lusaka West.

"The vehicle had 18 passengers on board and was extensively damaged," Mr Chilabi said.

He said preliminary investigations indicate that the accident due to excessive speed, which caused the driver to lose control of the vehicle.

"The vehicle veered off the road to the right and overturned into a

drainage," Mr Chilabi said.

He said three passengers died on the spot.

Police named those who died as Elton Mulenga, 38, of Lusaka, an unidentified man, and a woman whose identity is yet to be established.

He said the injured passengers comprising five males and 10 females have been admitted to Kapiri Mposhi District Hospital.

The Zambia Police Service has urged motorists to exercise caution, observe speed limits, and adhere to road traffic regulations to prevent loss of life.

Farmers welcome maize export

STAKEHOLDERS in the agriculture sector have welcomed Government's decision to lift restrictions on the export of maize and mealie meal, with a caution to farmers to ensure household food security by only selling the surplus.

On Thursday, Government lifted restrictions on the export of maize and its products to strengthen farmer incomes and expand market opportunities. The decision also aims at supporting local farmers and enhancing economic activity in

the agriculture sector.

In an interview, National Association for Smallholder Farmers (NASFA) executive director Frank Kayula described the decision as a step in the right direction, especially that the country has enough maize in stock.

Professor Kayula further cautioned farmers against selling their fields to private buyers, saying the practice is wrong because it undervalues the product.

And Zambian Small-scale Farmers Network chief executive officer Edward Nsama said it is important that farmers sell their maize to FRA

to ensure national food security.

Mr Nsama proposed that Government put up milling plants across the country to cut down cartels within commercial millers that exploit the State by exorbitantly hiking the prices of the staple food.

Chief Chibwika of Mwinilunga District says lifting of the restrictions will improve incomes for farmers and promote fair market access.

The traditional leader emphasised the need for value addition, encouraging farmers to process their produce into finished and semi-finished goods like mealie meal and peanut butter.

Speaking during the Chibwika chiefdom field day hosted at Kanyanda farm, he said transforming rural economies requires deliberate efforts to modernise agricultural practices, strengthen trade systems and attract meaningful investment.

Chief Chibwika also urged communities to tap into other economic opportunities, including honey production, by leveraging the area's rich forest resources.

He said agriculture remains the backbone of the chiefdom's economy, with maize production playing a critical role in contributing to food security.

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Communicable diseases now among village people

Minister raises concern over harmful lifestyle habits in rural places

MINISTER of Health Alex Katakwe is concerned that harmful lifestyle habits like consuming of fast foods, which are synonymous with urban areas, are shifting to rural places, leading to a hike in deaths associated with non-communicable diseases (NCDs). Dr Katakwe is further concerned about an emerging mental illness crisis, citing suicides among workers. He regrets the rising deaths

from NCDs in Southern Province, blaming it on shifting lifestyles, harmful myths and shrinking physical activity. Citing provincial data, Dr Katakwe said hypertension cases in Kazungula rose from 965 in 2024 to 1,399 last year, with an indication of increases in the first quarter of this year. This was in a speech read for him by Southern Province Permanent Secretary Namani Monze at the launch of the Village Vitality Foundation in Mukuni village. The foundation has taken practical steps by training 30 community volunteers in basic hypertension screening

and equipping them with blood pressure machines and glucometers for medical outreach. "Diets, we all want to be eating fast foods. Even in our homes now, we have changed. When someone comes back from work, all you want is to fry," Dr Katakwe said. He called for a lifestyle change among citizens to reverse mortalities associated with NCDs. The minister also noted that increased use of tobacco, including snuffing of sunsko, is being driven by 'dangerous' beliefs in communities. "Mental illness, mental

disease... these are some of the things that are happening in Zambia," he said, urging communities to remain compassionate and seek care. VVF co-founder Kabungo Katongo said she was motivated to take a step to promote wellness because of the rising cases of deaths linked to NCDs. Dr Katongo said it is regrettable that many people are losing their loved ones because of NCDs. She hopes that the trained volunteers will help to contribute to detecting hypertension in people. "I feel this is a perspective that has not been brought out.

We have younger people now who are coming with this condition. These are conditions we can control. These are conditions we can prevent and we have come to the community," Dr Katongo said. Inankwazi, Chief Mukuni's wife and chairperson of the VVF queen influencers, said: "We are looking at everyone because stress comes from every angle, we have burnouts, so we are trying to see on how we can prevent these diseases." Other queen influencers invited were wives of Senior Chief Musokotwane, Chief Sandwe, Chief Imwiko and Chief Mumbi.

'Peace ahead of polls speaks of good leadership'

GOVERNANCE experts have attributed the prevailing peace in the country in the run-up to the general election in August to steady leadership demonstrated by President Hakaiinde Hichilema. Centre for Sustainable Democracy and Governance (CSDG) said it's not by mistake that the country's political atmosphere has continued to be characterised by peace and calmness during an election period. Speaking in an interview, organisation executive director Caroline Katotobwe said this calmness signals a stabilised political environment. She said this portrays Zambia as a thriving democracy to the world. "Leadership is very important. Where you have good leadership, you will have the calmness [like] what we are witnessing today. Where there is poor and bad leadership, you will experience anarchy or high levels of lawlessness," she said. "Usually, based on the past, you would find this period characterised by a lot of unhealthy political behaviour perpetuated mostly by supporters from the ruling party. In 2021, such a period

was a time for lawlessness. But this time around we are not seeing that. Why? Because of leadership." According to Ms Katotobwe, President Hichilema's leadership is top-notch because he has restored the rule of law. "It is really good to see people freely expressing themselves and able to wear party regalia in public places. We are not hearing of anyone being harassed or victimised. This is the Zambia we long yearned for and it is unprecedented," she stated. Ms Katotobwe is hopeful that this political calmness and peace will continue, and that those who want to cause anarchy should face the wrath of the law. And Southern African Centre for the Constructive Resolution of Disputes (SACCORD) executive director Arthur Muyumba said the prevailing peace indicates that citizens feel less threatened through political violence compared to previous electoral cycles. "Sometimes calmness can reflect improved governance practices by the ruling party." Mr Muyumba said bad electoral indicators such as hate speech must not be allowed to take centre-stage during this period.

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He urged UPND members to be campaign managers and invite others to join the ruling party. "Everybody is a campaign manager. Are young people going out to campaign?" he said, as the crowd exclaimed, "Yes!" Mr Hichilema said the UPND remains a vehicle for delivering development and improving the welfare of citizens through programmes like free education and the enhanced Constituency Development Fund (CDF). "...no family is not benefiting from

CDF - K40 million, over years, it will be more, as we develop the economy. We are here to work for the people of Zambia," Mr Hichilema said. He also urged Zambians to be wary of politicians who had subjected the country to hooliganism. "Reflect how 2021 was, when we met as UPND, there would have been beatings and tear gas outside there. Today we can meet this way, in peace." The President also thanked UPND Alliance partners for their confidence in him. He further hailed student union representatives for their continued

support and for endorsing him for the August 13 general election. "I have seen old politicians mocking young students. How can you compete with young students in politics, abusing young people? It means they are reducing themselves to the level lower than the students. The students are intellectuals." Earlier, UPND chairperson for elections Likando Mufalali said the successful conclusion of the nomination process is in line with the party's constitution and electoral guidelines. He said the president was nominated by Luapula Province and supported by five others, in line with the party

constitution. And the independent commission tasked to verify the nomination papers, led by Isaac Mwanza, validated Mr Hakaiinde Hichilema's nomination. Mr Mwanza said Mr Hichilema is fully paid up and has been a continuous member of the party since 1998, while commending the UPND for practising intra-party democracy. Meanwhile, President Hichilema donated K1 million to UPND for party operations and mobilisation. Presidential political advisor Levy Ngoma said the donation demonstrates Mr Hichilema's love for the UPND.

And New Nation Party (NNP) president Nevers Mumba urged citizens not to be misled into believing that the Patriotic Front (PF) has transformed. He urged the public not to forget the challenges they went through under the former regime, including the widespread

lawlessness in the country. Dr Mumba said President Hichilema has demonstrated firm leadership for Zambia, which the UPND Alliance firmly supports. UPND Alliance chairperson Charles Millupi urged sympathisers of the governing party not to relax but to garner more support for the organisation to attain victory in the polls.

"We need 60 to 80 percent of the votes. But for that to happen, everyone should be a campaign manager, and we need to unite," he said. Democratic Party (DP) president Judith Kabemba said that under President Hichilema's leadership, Zambia is in safe hands. Ms Kabemba hailed Mr

Hichilema for introducing free education and his zeal to fight corruption. UPND Lusaka Province chairperson Obvious Mwaliteta said the region will ensure it delivers votes for the party. Mr Mwaliteta also introduced former Chongwe Mayor Geoffrey Chumbwe, Muchinga Ward 28 councillor Lee Mukupa,

and two other civic leaders who defected to the UPND. UPND Copperbelt Province chairperson Elisha Matambo said the journey to win the forthcoming general election has started. Various university and college student unions have also offered their continued support to Mr Hichilema.

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Mr Mulenga also said Government is working to resuscitate pharmaceutical manufacturing in Ndola, including the revival of Gamma and Baxy pharmaceuticals, which previously produced panadol and essential antibiotics. "We are also working tirelessly, under the guidance of the President, to ensure that the pharmaceutical companies that once operated here are resuscitated. "Very soon, we will officially announce the reopening of Baxy Pharmaceuticals here in Ndola, to ensure

a reliable supply of medicines while creating employment opportunities for pharmacists, chemical engineers and other professionals," he added. Mr Mulenga said Baxy Pharmaceuticals, once a key manufacturer of vital drugs, had been entangled in court proceedings for over seven years, but is now on course for revival following a presidential directive in collaboration with the Ministry of Health. He said the initiatives mirror the New Dawn administration's broader industrialisation drive aimed at building a resilient and self-sustaining economy.

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He added that achieving gender equality requires collective effort, noting that

"moving mountains is not something women can do alone". Mr Kayumba also commended WFL for its impact

in mentorship, career guidance and community development. He donated K10,000 towards the completion of a maternity wing in Mwalukanga village in Chongwe District. Standard Chartered Bank chief executive officer Sonny Zulu commended the organisation's work over the past five years, noting that women are increasingly stepping forward with confidence and competence, and no longer waiting for permission to lead. Mr Zulu donated K20,000 towards the maternity project. WFL executive director for vulnerable communities' pillar Sibeso Mofya said the organisation has so far reached over 1,000 women and impacted 5,000 people across 24 cohorts under three flagship programmes, MentorHer, InnovateHer and Women in the Boardroom. "In the last five years of WFL's existence through its vulnerable community's pillar, we have also impacted our community focusing on SDG, education, health and sanitation, reaching over 500 vulnerable people in Mwalukanga village in Chongwe," she said. Ms Mofya said WFL has also sponsored 65 vulnerable but high-performing girls through university under a fully funded scholarship programme supported by Beautiful World

Canada. This year, WFL is working on building a maternity ward and clinic, with support from Debonairs Pizza Zambia. The project is expected to be handed over by October this year. WFL founder Mizinga Melu described the organisation's five-year journey as a movement driven by the belief

that empowering women uplifts entire communities. "As we celebrate five years, it is five years of impact and proving that nothing is impossible for the girl child," she said. Ms Melu explained that the organisation initially focused on mentorship before expanding its work to rural areas.





'Don't use phone while answering call of nature'

IT'S a mobile phone, yes, but a medical doctor says using the gadget while in the toilet is unhygienic. Kabwe Central Province medical director Elijah Mutoloki noted that there are certain unhygienic habits that people are engaging in which have the potential to negatively affect their health, and using a mobile phone in the toilet is one of them. Dr Mutoloki said that while a mobile phone is an important communication tool, if not properly handled, it can become a source of concern in terms of hygiene.

He said in an interview yesterday that he always advises people against using their mobile phones in the toilet due to the risk of bacterial contamination. He implored people not to compromise their health by embracing unhygienic habits that have the potential to harm them. He said citizens must also not neglect the habit of washing their hands or using hand sanitisers after using the toilet, as such measures are medically recommended. "If possible, even a phone should be sanitised because it can be a source of infection." Meanwhile, Dr Mutoloki said people need to keep themselves

warm to protect against colds and flu as the cold season approaches. He said people should keep themselves warm, stay well hydrated and remain indoors as much as possible to fend off viral respiratory infections. He added that it is also important to eat plenty of fruits and maintain a healthy diet to stay in good health. "We do not need to eat fruits only when we are sick; it should be a routine. And if we are able, we should eat fruits every day as much as possible," he said. Dr Mutoloki said having a balanced diet is important to keep the whole body functioning well, thus ensuring that a person enjoys good health.

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Muchinga PS advises civil servants

Stop engaging in destructive conduct like consuming alcohol, wasting time on social media

CIVIL servants in Muchinga Province have been advised to refrain from engaging in destructive conduct like consuming alcohol and wasting time on social media while on

duty as the vices negatively affect service delivery. Muchinga Province Permanent Secretary Tuesday says public workers should focus on enhancing service delivery as opposed to consuming beer and spending most of the work hours on social platforms. According to a statement issued by Muchinga Province

principal public relations officer Ruth Mumba, Dr Bwalya said this during a provincial development coordinating committee (PDCC) meeting. He said civil servants also need to keep time, work as a team and conduct effective delegations so that service delivery is not interrupted. "Engaging in destructive behaviours like beer drinking is

a thing of the past. Deliverables and results are what matters," Dr Bwalya said. He also advised public workers to refrain from engaging in corruption, nepotism and tribalism as the vices affect productivity. Dr Bwalya said government workers should ensure they work professionally and resist graft so that there is

no compromise on service delivery. He also tasked the workers to be prudent in the management of finances by ensuring that procurement adheres to the principle of right price and quality, and timely delivery of projects. Dr Bwalya hailed employees in the local authorities for improved delivery of

Constituency Development Fund (CDF) projects. He later toured Kenneth Kaunda Secondary School in Chinsali District which is undergoing rehabilitation of sanitation facilities. Dr Bwalya commended management at the school for the progress made on the works. He also advised management

at the school to ensure they monitor the works so that they can be completed on time. Dr Bwalya directed head teachers in the province to maintain high standards of sanitation in schools. He said maintaining sanitation facilities in schools is a requirement for creating a safe conducive learning environment for learners.

Historian hails Govt recognition of chiefs

A HISTORIAN at the University of Zambia says the recent salary increment for traditional leaders and their retainers shows the importance the New Dawn administration attaches to chiefs as key partners to national development.

Government has increased salaries for chiefs by K5,000, while retainers' salaries have been increased by K3,000, effective January 1.

Following the increment, paramount chiefs will now be getting K18,000 from K13,000, senior chiefs K16,500 from

K11,500, while ordinary chiefs will now be paid K15,000 from K10,000.

Chiefs' retainers, commonly known as kapasos, will be getting K5,500 from K2,500.

Speaking in an interview yesterday, Euston Chiputa, a lecturer at the University of Zambia, said it is only after 2021 that Government has begun to recognise through action the critical role traditional leaders play in national governance, economic development and in uniting citizens.

"I think you have seen that the current administration has been taking traditional leaders across the country to appreciate

each other in terms of traditional ceremonies. Beyond that, this Government has also given them farming inputs so that they do not over-rely on their subjects," he said.

He said national development is now inclusive and traditional leaders in rural settings will take up a leading role.

Dr Chiputa said the salary increment will motivate chiefs to effectively inspect government projects, especially with the enhanced Constituency Development Fund (CDF).

And UPND Alliance chairperson Charles Milupi said the salary increment shows that the New Dawn administration

does not segregate. "From uniting them, building palaces, providing them with transport, providing them with farm inputs and now salary increment, it shows that we value them as key players in national development."

Mr Milupi said Government has utmost respect for all the traditional leaders, hence honouring their contribution to national development through deeds.

House of Chiefs chairperson Chief Chongo confirmed that all the traditional leaders and their retainers received their new salaries, including arrears for the past three months.

Govt to continue supporting SMEs

NORTH-WESTERN Province Permanent Secretary Grandson Katambi says Government is moving beyond theory in addressing unemployment by providing practical support to small and medium enterprises (SMEs) and cooperatives.

Colonel Katambi said the New Dawn administration has deliberately invested in infrastructure and business development initiatives aimed at empowering local entrepreneurs and creating jobs.

Speaking during the SMEs and Cooperatives Business Development Training in Solwezi, Col Katambi said Government recognises the critical role SMEs play in driving economic growth.

"The establishment and running of the Solwezi Industrial Yard under the Skills Development and Entrepreneurship Project

Supporting Women and Youth is a clear demonstration of Government's commitment to supporting SMEs and cooperatives," he said.

Col Katambi said the industrial yard, which was commissioned on September 25, 2025, is now home to 18 SMEs operating in sectors such as water processing, leather products, agro-processing, timber and textiles.

He said the diversity of businesses at the yard reflects the vast entrepreneurial potential in North-Western Province.

Col Katambi said Government has realised that infrastructure alone is not enough, and that entrepreneurs also need strong business management skills, financial discipline, market intelligence and competitiveness.

He said it is for this reason that the Skills Development and Entrepreneurship Project, in collaboration with the Lobito Corridor Trade Facilitation

Project, has trained two cohorts of business development service providers to support local entrepreneurs.

Col Katambi said the trained facilitators will transfer knowledge and practical skills to SME operators and cooperative members in Solwezi.

He said North-Western Province is strategically positioned to benefit from the Lobito Corridor because of its access to regional and international markets.

Col Katambi urged SMEs and cooperatives to improve product quality, formalise their operations and position themselves to take advantage of expanded trade opportunities.

"This is the time to prepare to benefit from the corridor. It is not time to complain while doing nothing," he said.

Col Katambi also urged participants to treat the training as a turning point and not just a routine.

Shop lifting at Shoprite Cairo Road worries magistrate

LUSAKA magistrate Fine Mayambu is concerned about the increase in petty thefts at Shoprite Cairo Road outlet in Lusaka, and says the supermarket needs protection.

The magistrate said this before jailing 47-year-old Njungu Makai, of Zani Muone, to two months' imprisonment for stealing two tins of Kiwi polish from Shoprite on Cairo Road.

This comes barely a week after a youth was jailed six months for stealing Jacobs coffee from the same store.

And a 23-year-old security guard has admitted to breaking into a Zambia Information and Communications Technology Authority (ZICTA) building, where he stole two laptops worth almost K40,000.

Cuthbert Mambwe, who told the court that he is a

Yango driver, is charged with breaking into a building and committing a felony.

Claims are that between January 31 and February 1 this year, the accused, with intent to steal, broke into a ZICTA building and stole two laptops.

The laptops, valued at K39,013.27, belong to ZICTA. Mambwe, who appeared sombre and spoke in a low tone, appeared before magistrate Mayambu on Tuesday last week for taking plea.

After the charge was read, the accused readily admitted to the offence.

"How did you steal?" the magistrate asked the accused, who said he removed the laptops through the window. "Where did you take them (laptops)?" magistrate Mayambu further queried the accused, who told the court that he sold the gadgets.

"I sold the laptops at K1,800

[each]," he said. "Did you have any claim of right to the property?" the court asked the youth, who replied in the negative.

Mambwe later clarified that while he admitted the offence, he did not "break into" the building.

But the magistrate informed the accused that at law, "breaking into a building" is not literal or damaging the infrastructure to access the building.

A prosecutor informed the court that the matter should be adjourned to a later date for reading of the statement of facts and possible sentencing.

The magistrate adjourned the case to tomorrow.

Meanwhile, faction PF secretary-general Raphael Nakacinda has appealed against the judgment which validated the extraordinary general conference which elected Miles Sampa as president on October 24, 2023.

ZIPS tips procurement professionals

ZAMBIA Institute of Purchasing and Supply (ZIPS) has urged procurement professionals to avoid unnecessary bureaucratic delays that hinder efficiency.

ZIPS president Daniel Kabamba says professionals should embrace speed in the procurement process while observing established regulations and procedures.

Speaking at a media briefing yesterday, Mr Kabamba said delays in procurement processes often translate into delayed infrastructure development, delivery of goods and services and, ultimately, late benefits to citizens.

He said procurement is a vital engine that drives development projects and service delivery across all sectors of the economy, adding that professionals

should adopt proper planning, early engagement with stakeholders and effective use of technology.

"While compliance with procurement laws and procedures remains essential and non-negotiable, practitioners should, therefore, avoid unnecessary bureaucratic delays that hinder efficiency."

Mr Kabamba also said ZIPS will conduct its independent investigations on developments at the Zambia Medicines and Medical Supplies Agency (ZAMMSA).

Recently, Minister of Health Alex Katakwe suspended five senior procurement and supply chain officers at ZAMMSA, a move he said was aimed at curbing inefficiency, negligence and any form of misconduct at the institution.

Mr Kabamba said inquiry by ZIPS will be conducted professionally, objectively and without bias, reaffirming its commitment to upholding

professionalism and accountability.

"We wish to assure the public and stakeholders that the findings of the investigations will be made known to the public at an appropriate time, in line with our commitment to transparency and accountability."

He urged the affected ZAMMSA staff to cooperate in order to arrive at a fair conclusion and to promote mutuality.

Mr Kabanda applauded Government's commitment to central repository statistical reporting and monitoring of national projects through the Presidential Delivery Unit (PDU) under the monitoring and evaluation framework.

He said effective monitoring and reporting mechanisms are essential in ensuring projects are delivered on time, within budget, and according to specifications.

43 families in Mufulira harvest first crop of fish

Residents applaud Govt for initiative providing them with financial income

FORTY-THREE vulnerable families in Kawama East and Kamuchanga townships in Mufulira District have successfully

harvested their first crop of fish under the Government's Alternative Livelihood Programme (ALP). Mufulira District Commissioner Evaristo Chilumba, who described the harvest as a milestone for the district, applauded the Government for the initiative,

stating that the project is a vital tool for reducing poverty and providing residents with sustainable financial income. Mr Chilumba urged the beneficiaries to work together as a community to ensure the long-term success of the project. "There are many people benefiting from this because

but viable farmers," she said. A beneficiary, Emmanuel Mutale, expressed gratitude to the Government for the empowerment. Mr Mutale assured that the beneficiaries will continue in aquaculture after passing on fingerlings to the next beneficiaries.

Mpika residents urged to participate in polio vaccination

MPIKA residents have been challenged to take the Novel Oral Polio Virus Type 2 (nOPV2) supplementary immunisation campaign seriously ahead of the upcoming vaccination exercise. Ministry of Health district director of health services Arthur Mataka says there is a need for concerted efforts among stakeholders to strategise and strengthen community participation in readiness for the campaign.

Dr Mataka said it is important for collective action in combating the circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2), which was recently detected in Lusaka Province. He urged stakeholders to actively support the campaign to ensure its success, warning that failure to contain the virus could have serious health

consequences, particularly among children. Dr Mataka said the vaccination campaign will commence in urban areas, which are more prone due to high population density, before being extended to rural parts of the district. He said Mpika is targeting a total of 29,549 children under the age of five during the exercise, scheduled to run from April 20 to April 23 this year.

He further called on stakeholders to intensify community sensitisation and mobilisation efforts to ensure all eligible children are reached. "We need everyone on board, including traditional leaders, community health workers, schools and local authorities," he said. Dr Mataka said the district is committed to ensuring that no child under five should be missed during the campaign. Mpika District Commissioner

David Siame called on the public to fully embrace the campaign once it begins next Monday.

Mr Siame urged parents and guardians to ensure their children are attended to by health personnel who will be conducting door-to-door vaccinations during the exercise.

He said the upcoming vaccination exercise forms part of a nationwide response aimed at preventing the spread of the polio virus and safeguarding the health of children across the country.

Community members have welcomed the Government's decision to conduct the campaign, describing it as a timely intervention to protect children from the disease.

A resident of Trench Town area, Timothy Mwila, commended authorities for taking proactive measures against polio. "We do not want any person to be infected by the polio virus," he said.

Mpulungu records 179 cases of teenage pregnancies

THE Ministry of Health in Mpulungu District has recorded 179 cases of teenage pregnancies in the first two months of this year.

District adolescent health focal point person Ireen Lumanyendo said the cases of teenage pregnancies have been registered in health facilities in the district. Speaking during the review and reflection meeting, Ms Lumanyendo said the department has also recorded over 270 cases of common sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in the last two months.

She said the department is concerned that the number of cases might increase by the end of the first quarter as data for the third month has not yet been compiled.

"We are receiving high numbers of teenage pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections and that has become of a concern, we need concerted

efforts to fight this. "Let all stakeholders work together to fight teenage pregnancies because despite all the efforts that are being put in place by the Government and other cooperating partners, these problems have persisted," she said.

Ms Lumanyendo also observed that adolescent pregnancies have in most cases negatively affected the lives of many young people because they face stigma from their peers and sometimes parents.

She said that as a result of stigma, the children tend to feel shy to go back to school if they are not counselled properly, thereby failing to get employed and hence continuing with the cycle of poverty.

Ms Lumanyendo said the Department of Health has continued to carry out sensitisation in school health outreaches and conducting community engagement in order to continue with the fight against child marriages and adolescent

pregnancies. Niamukolo Day Secondary School's Rise and Shine programme chairperson Faith Mazimba said adolescent pregnancies have serious medical and mental impact on the young people that endure the challenge.

Ms Mazimba said it is unfortunate that more children, especially those of school-going age, have continued to get pregnant despite all the efforts being made for them to remain in school.

She said her school programme, which is being supported by different stakeholders in the district, has been trying to counsel young people on the dangers of engaging in early sex and illicit activities.

Ms Mazimba said the Rise and Shine programme has started conducting outreaches and having other children to petition and making their promise to stay in school and avoid marriage and pregnancies.

Kaputa residents commend Govt on CDF projects

"We had instances where one classroom could accommodate over 100 learners due to non-availability of classroom space, but with these classroom spaces added, it will help improve the learning environment," he said.

He said the coming of the structure has positively impacted on the teaching and learning environment for teachers and learners.

Patience Changwe, a Grade 11 pupil at the same school, thanked the Government for providing enough classroom space.

Another learner, Martin Kabuta, said the construction of a new structure has transformed the learning experience.

Kabuta said before the building of the classrooms, some lessons were conducted under a tree, which was challenging for

pupils. Kaputa Town Council secretary Emrys Kuyokwa commended the Government for the timely disbursement of the constituency money.

"We thank the Government for the timely disbursement of the Constituency Development Fund allocation. Without it, these projects would not have been possible," he said.

Mr Kuyokwa also said the local authority has used CDF to work on several projects in the district, adding that more projects are underway.

Lumezi begins implementation of revised CfW programme

LUMEZI Town Council has started implementing the revised Cash for Work (CfW) programme, after receiving K100,000 from the Ministry of Local Government and Rural Development for administrative purposes.

The allocation to Lumezi is part of a nationwide disbursement of K15.6 million aimed at supporting the rollout of the programme in the 156 constituencies.

In line with this development, the local authority has launched a community and stakeholder sensitisation campaign to raise awareness about the revised

programme and its operational guidelines.

A joint team from the council and the district administration conducted sensitisation meetings in Kazembe and Kapangala wards.

The exercise was preceded by a courtesy call at Chief Kazembe's palace, where traditional leaders were briefed on the programme and its intended outcomes.

Lumezi Town Council assistant public relations officer Irvin Muyumbwa said the sensitisation exercise is a critical step to be undertaken before rolling out project activities.

He said that the revised CfW programme is a conditional cash transfer initiative designed to

provide short-term employment opportunities to residents.

"The programme will see eligible residents engaged for a period of 10 days and be paid K600. It is a government response aimed at addressing poverty and unemployment at community level," he said.

Mr Muyumbwa said that the initiative is task-based and labour-intensive, focusing on public works such as road maintenance and environmental clean-up.

He said that the programme is being implemented under the theme work today, earn today, improve your community and seek to provide immediate income, while improving local infrastructure.

Construction of Litoya maternity annex in Nalolo advances

CONSTRUCTION of the Litoya maternity annex at Litoya Rural Health Centre in Lubosi Ward in Nalolo District is almost complete, with an estimated 98 percent of the work done on the project.

Nalolo Town Council public relations officer Butyson Kandimba said the local authority awarded a contract to Newa Liberal General Dealers to complete phase two of the construction of the maternity annex at K1,854,237.30.

Mr Kandimba said the project, which has been funded from last year's Constituency Development Fund (CDF) allocation, will benefit a catchment population of 3,629.

"Currently, the contractor is working on finishing the building before handing over the project. The maternity annex has delivery rooms to provide antenatal and postnatal services to ensure safe and dignified childbirth experiences," he said.

Mr Kandimba said the council has embarked on an ambitious programme to build maternity annexes at health facilities to

strengthen the district's maternal healthcare system.

He also said the local authority has intensified supervision of all ongoing CDF projects to ensure compliance with contractor specifications and achieve value for money.

A Nalolo resident, Felistus Mundia, commended the local authority for the construction of the maternity wing, saying that expectant mothers will now deliver in a conducive environment.

Ms Mundia said the development will motivate all pregnant women to go to the

health centre because they know that all the services required are provided.

"We are very excited about the construction of this maternity annex because it will help all expectant mothers to have a safe place for delivery and it will reduce the long distance that people used to travel to access these services," she said.

President Hakainde Hichilema directed councils to build maternity annexes at health facilities using CDF to improve maternal healthcare and reduce maternal deaths.

Why Zambia must push forward with Local Content SI

Zambia still at early stages of this journey, but direction is encouraging

RECENT developments in Australia's mining sector – particularly Rio Tinto's deliberate strengthening of local supplier participation – offer a compelling reference point for Zambia's Local Content Statutory Instrument (LC SI). The global trend is clear: when mining policy aligns with domestic economic interests, the benefits extend far beyond the mine.

In 2025, Rio Tinto directed approximately A\$19.7 billion toward Australian suppliers, a notable increase from the previous year. This level of domestic procurement did not happen by chance. It reflects a coordinated approach between government and industry to ensure that mining activity stimulates broader economic growth within the country.

Zambia has now positioned itself on a similar trajectory. Since the LC SI came into effect on January 1, 2026, there has been a noticeable and encouraging shift in how mining companies engage with local suppliers. The early signals from the sector are positive and deserve recognition.

Major operators such as Mopani Copper Mines, First Quantum Minerals' Kansanshi and Trident Mines, Barrick Gold's Lumwana Mine and emerging operators such as Kobold have begun expanding

their local procurement footprints and taking a structured approach. This is not merely regulatory compliance – it is a strategic business approach that recognises the value of integrating local enterprises into the mining value chain.

Mining companies have already reported early wins since the introduction of the LC SI. Zambian suppliers are increasingly participating in both core and non-core goods and services. In some cases, operators are exceeding the previously reported 24 percent local content thresholds in core categories. This is a significant development for Zambia's mining sector.

These gains are translating into real economic activity. Local contractors are securing more work, while supporting industries such as engineering, transport, fabrication and maintenance services are experiencing increased demand. Employment opportunities are gradually expanding beyond the boundaries of the mines themselves.

Equally important is the spirit of collaboration now taking shape. Progress suggests that both Government and industry are finding common ground in implementing the LC SI. This is critical, as local content policies are most effective when driven by partnership rather than confrontation.

The Zambian approach is not about limiting investment or creating barriers. It is about deepening participation and ensuring that the value generated from mineral resources has a stronger domestic impact. This aligns with global best practice and mirrors what successful mining jurisdictions have achieved over time.

Australia provides a useful long-term benchmark. The scale of local supplier integration there demonstrates what is possible when policy consistency is matched by sustained corporate commitment. Thousands of local businesses are integrated into mining operations, and significant portions of mining

expenditure are retained within the national economy.

Zambia is still at the early stages of this journey, but the direction is encouraging. The fact that mining companies are already moving beyond minimum thresholds indicates a willingness to adapt and invest in local partnerships. This momentum must be maintained.

Going forward, the focus should be on strengthening collaboration. Continued dialogue between Government and mining companies will be essential. Equally important will be developing local supplier capacity to meet industry standards in quality, scale and reliability.

Financial institutions, training bodies and industry associations also have a role to play in supporting Zambian businesses so they can compete effectively within mining supply chains. Local content is not only about policy – it is also about preparedness and competitiveness. Financial capacity building for local companies is critical to ensuring success. In this regard, some mining companies have already initiated processes, through open tenders, to onboard financial institutions, and the response from commercial banks has been positive.

Kobold held a well-publicised local companies symposium at their site last year, where participation was overwhelmingly positive. Industry-wide, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is championing supplier development programmes (SDPs) to build capacity and scale for local companies.

Tangible success stories are already emerging, particularly through First Quantum Minerals. Recently, the company awarded a transport contract valued at approximately US\$35 million to four Zambian-owned firms, demonstrating confidence in local capacity. Beyond this, a cable networking company has significantly upgraded its quality of service and operational standards due to increased contract opportunities. A construction firm that began with just one employee has expanded

to a workforce of over 300, directly supported by sustained engagement with mining projects. Similarly, a multi-disciplinary engineering company that started modestly now manages nine concurrent contracts with First Quantum, with its workforce growing more than tenfold. This growth has strengthened technical capacity, improved delivery quality, and expanded revenue, illustrating how deliberate local content support can transform small enterprises into formidable industry players.

What is emerging is a shared opportunity that requires shared responsibility. For Government, it is a chance to translate mineral wealth into broader economic development. For mining companies, it is an opportunity to build resilient, efficient, and locally integrated supply chains. For Zambian businesses, it is an opportunity to grow, industrialise, and participate meaningfully in one of the country's most important sectors.

The progress recorded since January 2026 should be seen as a foundation. It demonstrates that the LC SI is beginning to work in practice and, more importantly, that collaboration between GRZ and mining companies can deliver measurable results.

If this trajectory is sustained, Zambia stands to significantly increase the value it derives from its mining sector. Over time, the country can move closer to models such as Australia, where mining is not only an extractive activity but also a powerful driver of domestic enterprise development.

The task now is to build on what has already been achieved. With continued cooperation, consistency in policy implementation and a shared commitment to progress, the LC SI has the potential to reshape Zambia's mining economy in a way that is inclusive, sustainable and nationally beneficial.

With around 96 percent water content, cucumbers are excellent for hydration. Eating them unpeeled ensures maximum nutritional benefit.

2. Rich in antioxidants

Antioxidants help protect the body from oxidative stress caused by free radicals, which are linked to chronic illnesses such as cancer, heart disease, and autoimmune conditions.

Studies have shown that cucumbers contain flavonoids and tannins, compounds particularly effective at neutralising harmful free radicals. Supplementation with cucumber powder has been found to improve antioxidant status, though the doses used in research are higher than those found in everyday consumption.

3. Promotes hydration

Water is vital for regulating body temperature, transporting nutrients, and removing waste. Proper hydration supports metabolism and physical performance.

As cucumbers are composed of about 96 percent water, they are especially effective at helping the body meet its daily fluid requirements.

4. Supports weight loss

Cucumbers are very low in calories – just 16 calories per 104 grams. Their high water content also promotes satiety, making them a useful addition to weight-loss diets.

They can add freshness and flavour to salads, sandwiches and side dishes, or serve as a low-calorie alternative to heavier foods. Research has linked diets rich in water-dense, low-calorie foods to significant reductions in body weight.

5. May help lower blood sugar

Animal and laboratory studies suggest that cucumbers may help reduce blood sugar levels and protect against diabetes-related complications. For example, cucumber peel extract lowered blood sugar in diabetic mice.

While these findings are promising, more human studies are needed to confirm the effect.

6. Supports regular bowel movements

Dehydration is a common cause of constipation. Cucumbers, being high in water, help maintain hydration and improve stool consistency.

They also contain fibre, particularly pectin, which increases bowel movement frequency and supports gut health by feeding beneficial bacteria.

The bottom line

Cucumbers are refreshing, nutritious and versatile. With their crisp flavour, they can be enjoyed fresh, pickled, or as a low-calorie snack. They pair well with hummus, olive oil, lemon, or salad dressings, making them a simple yet powerful addition to a healthy diet.

2026 elections: A test of civic discipline

THE year 2026 marks another pivotal election for Zambia – an election that feels distinct from those of the past. While heightened political temperatures are inevitable, it is more crucial than ever that we demonstrate the highest levels of civility and responsibility.

As political parties from both the ruling and opposition sides emerge to share campaign messages, citizens carry a significant responsibility. In a flourishing democracy, voters must engage with these diverse messages and make what civic education calls “moments of decision”. These are critical junctures where voters choose leaders who will

shape the future of their wards, constituencies and the nation at large.

Yet beyond the act of choosing leaders, we must reflect on a deeper civic question: What kind of citizens are we becoming before, during and after an election?

Living democratically means embodying the values of a healthy democracy – responsibility, maturity, and full awareness of our civic identity. By this, I refer to the conduct of citizens who understand their mandate to read the political climate correctly, rather than being swayed by every campaign message. It involves respect for others, adherence to the rule of law, and peaceful participation devoid of character assassination or hate speech. Ultimately, it is about a commitment to the common good.

These values must define our national life this year. We must not allow unnecessary emotions and divisions to dominate. An election year is not only a test for political parties and governance institutions – it is also a test for citizens themselves. Peaceful and credible elections do not occur by chance; they are sustained by the discipline of both political players and the general public.

As a country admired globally for its stability, Zambia must ensure this record remains

unbroken on August 13, 2026. This requires restraint, discipline and patriotism.

It is vital to stress that democracy is not always about convergence. Its essence lies in the right to differ. However, differing in ideas should not lead to a decline in civility. In recent years, we have observed a worrying trend where opposition political players, under the guise of freedom of expression, create false or alarming situations or abuse cyberspace with impunity to challenge those in power. This is not what it means to be civically organised; it reflects a misunderstanding of democracy.

Elections should not be a time for trading insults, violence, or open hostility. The role of the opposition is clearly defined: to be a “government in waiting” with clear alternative policies. It is not to undermine the Presidency or practise stubbornness with impunity. A mature democracy requires citizens who can debate principles without dehumanising one another. We must be able to disagree politically while remaining united nationally.

Misinformation and disinformation also pose serious challenges. Citizens must verify information before sharing it. No nation makes wise democratic decisions based on misleading statements intended to cause

alarm. I encourage Zambian citizens to look beyond the excitement of songs, slogans and personalities. We must choose leadership capable of addressing real challenges – such as free education, youth empowerment, healthcare, economic growth, agricultural productivity, debt sustainability, and other pressing national issues.

Democracy becomes stronger when we vote on the basis of issues and leadership quality, rather than emotion, tribe, or partisan loyalty. Young people, in particular, must refuse to be used as tools for conflict. Our strength should be found in debate, innovation, and respect for institutions. While these institutions are not beyond criticism, such feedback must be delivered lawfully and constructively.

As the country heads towards the polls, I call upon all citizens of this great nation to remain peaceful, informed, tolerant and law-abiding. Let our civic discipline be the light that guides Zambia through 2026.

'Find way through', Starmer urges US, Iran

Initial peace talks between them finished without an agreement

LONDON - Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer has urged the US and Iran "to find a way through", after initial peace talks between Iran and the US finished without an agreement to end the war.

Sir Keir warned against "further escalation" in the Middle East, after the negotiations between the two sides in Pakistan concluded in the early hours of yesterday.

Downing Street said the prime

minister discussed the talks - which the UK is not involved in - with the Sultan of Oman in a phone call yesterday.

The failure to reach a deal creates uncertainty over whether a fragile two-week ceasefire between Iran and the US will continue to hold.

US Vice-President JD Vance was in Pakistan for the talks and said Iran's refusal to commit to not build a nuclear weapon was the main reason for the lack of a deal.

Iran's delegation leader, Parliament Speaker Mohammad Bagher Ghalibaf,

said whilst his country had raised "forward-looking initiatives", the US had so far failed to gain its trust.

In a readout of Sir Keir's call with His Majesty Sultan Haitham bin Tarik al Said, a Downing Street spokesperson said: "They discussed the peace talks held in Pakistan over the weekend and urged both sides to find a way through."

"It was vital there was a continuation of the ceasefire, and that all parties avoided any further escalation, the leaders agreed."

Earlier, Health Secretary Wes Streeting told the BBC it was "disappointing" initial talks to end the war had broken down without a deal.

Streeting said the UK wanted to see a negotiated end to the war that "puts Iran's nuclear ambitions to bed".

The cabinet minister also said Sir Keir had made "the right choice" not to commit the UK to joining US-Israeli military strikes on Iran.

On the BBC's Sunday with Laura Kuenssberg programme, Streeting said: "It's obviously disappointing that the

talks have broken down for now.

But he said "the mere fact that the Americans and the Iranians were able to get around the table together is highly unusual and necessary."

He added: "It's the only way we're going to end this war."

Speaking to Sky News earlier, Streeting described President Trump's threat last week that "a whole civilisation will die tonight" unless Iran agreed a deal to end the war as "outrageous" and "extraordinary".



Ukraine, Russia accuse each other of hundreds of ceasefire violations

MOSCOW - Ukraine and Russia have accused one another of hundreds of violations of a short ceasefire coinciding with Orthodox Easter celebrations.

The Ukrainian military said yesterday morning that Russian forces had committed 2,299 violations since the truce began at 16:00 local time (13:00 GMT) on Saturday - including shooting four unarmed soldiers.

The Russian defence ministry, in turn, said Ukrainian forces had committed 1,971 violations, including three attempted counter-attacks in Dnipropetrovsk region.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky earlier said his nation's forces would respond "symmetrically" to Russian attacks during the ceasefire, calling Easter "a time of peace".

He added that he hoped the truce could be extended beyond Easter to facilitate peace negotiations which have all but stalled with the outbreak of war in the Middle East - but Russia rejected the idea, saying its attacks would resume today.

Russian troops mounted 28 attacks and carried out nearly 2,000 drone strikes, Ukraine's military said, but did not use bombs or missiles.

Russian forces in the north-



ZELENSKY eastern Kharkiv region executed four Ukrainian soldiers after the ceasefire came into force, the local prosecutor's office said, describing the incident as a "grave violation of international humanitarian law".

Ukraine's military said the troops were shot after being disarmed, calling it "another war crime by Russia".

Ukrainian authorities published what appears to be an image taken by a drone showing four bodies lying in a clearing.

In Ukraine's northern Sumy region, which borders Russia, local authorities said a Russian drone hit an ambulance overnight, injuring three medics.

Russia's defence ministry said Ukraine had launched three overnight attacks on positions in the Pokrovsk area and Otradne in Dnipropetrovsk region.

It also said four attempts by Ukrainian troops to advance in Sumy and Donetsk were

"thwarted".

Russian President Vladimir Putin announced the Easter ceasefire earlier this week, having previously resisted repeated calls from Ukraine for a temporary cessation of fighting. Zelensky said his forces would act in kind.

Earlier in the year, Putin acquiesced to a US request to halt strikes on energy infrastructure as Ukraine braced for bitterly cold temperatures.

Both Ukrainian and Russian sources accused each other of limited violations in the first few hours of the truce on Saturday, before making the much larger claims.

Ukrainian and Russian authorities also announced they had each swapped 175 prisoners of war on Saturday, including seven civilians a piece.

Ukrainian civilians and soldiers on the front lines of the conflict - which has been raging since 2022 - have low expectations about the ceasefire.

Kyiv has long pushed for a more comprehensive ceasefire, which it and its European allies see as a necessary first step towards striking a lasting end to the full-scale invasion.

But Moscow has insisted on agreeing a peace deal first, prompting accusations that it is not serious about ending the fighting.

After Iran talks falter, what happens next?

WASHINGTON - Twenty-one hours was not enough to end 47 years of hostility between Iran and the US.

The historic high-level talks in Islamabad, during a pause in weeks of grievous war, were always unlikely to end any other way.

Calling this marathon negotiating session a failure belies the scale of the challenge in narrowing wide gaps on complex issues ranging from age-old suspicion about Iran's nuclear programme to new challenges this war has thrown up - most of all Iran's control of the strategic Strait of Hormuz, whose closure is causing economic shocks worldwide.

To do a deal, they also needed to overcome a deep chasm of distrust.

A day ago, it wasn't even certain the two sides would meet, and even more, sit down

in the same room.

A long-standing political taboo was broken.

The urgent question now is: what happens next?

What happens to the contested two-week ceasefire which pulled the world back from US President Donald Trump's alarming threat to destroy a "whole civilisation" in Iran?

Would the US president be ready to send his negotiators back to the bargaining table?

We're hearing reports from sources here in Islamabad that some conversations have continued after US Vice-President JD Vance boarded his plane at sunrise, declaring the US delegation had made their "final and best offer".

Will the US now escalate or negotiate?

We still don't know enough about what happened behind tightly closed doors in a five-

star hotel in leafy locked-down Islamabad during talks that went on long into the night.

There are still few details on the disputes and discussion between the two sides, assisted by Pakistani mediators, the calls to and from experts, advisers, and, according to Vance, "dozens" of calls to Trump himself.

The vice-president spoke of the "core goal" of the US during his brief dawn news conference.

"We need to see an affirmative commitment that [Iran] will not seek a nuclear weapon and they will not seek the tools that would enable them to quickly achieve a nuclear weapon," he said.

During the last round of talks in February, before military strikes were unleashed again, Iran had offered new concessions including the dilution of its 440kg stockpile of

uranium enriched to 60 percent - dangerously close to weapons-grade.

But it still insists on its "right" to enrich and hasn't been willing to give up that stockpile, now said to be buried deep in the rubble after US and Israeli air strikes last year.

It's also refused repeated demands to open the Strait of Hormuz - to allow the free flow of vital traffic in oil, gas and other essential goods - in the absence of a new agreement.

Both the US and the Iranian delegations came to Islamabad emboldened by their belief that theirs was the winning side in this war.

And they engaged knowing that, if they failed, there was the option to keep fighting - whatever the spiralling pain for their own people and a world reeling from the cost of this conflagration.

- UK shelve Chagos deal**
LONDON - Sir Keir Starmer has shelved his Chagos Islands deal amid worsening relations with Donald Trump after the US failed to formally confirm its approval.
Trump had urged Starmer to scrap the deal despite earlier expressing support for the treaty. In January the president called the plan an "act of total weakness".
UK government officials have said they are not entirely abandoning the agreement - which would hand sovereignty of the British territory to Mauritius - but have run out of time to pass legislation before Parliament is prorogued in the coming weeks.
However, a new Chagos bill is not expected to feature in the King's Speech in mid-May.
It is understood the UK has still not received a formal exchange of letters from the US.
- Woman raped outside church**
LONDON - A woman has been raped by several men outside a church after leaving a nightclub in Surrey, police have said.
The woman, in her 20s, was followed after leaving Labyrinth Epsom nightclub and attacked between 02:00 BST and 04:00 on Saturday.
The attack is believed to have occurred outside Epsom Methodist Church in Ashley Road, Epsom.
Det Insp Aine Matthews said: "We understand this is an extremely distressing incident and the victim is being supported by specialist officers."
Police said that it currently did not have full descriptions of the suspects but officers were conducting extensive inquiries to identify and locate them.
"Our investigation is in its early stages," Matthews said.



MAIZE SALES PROGRAMME FOR 2026



1. Background

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HH energy agenda sparks stability

Small enterprises applaud stable power supply

REELING from last year's severe load-shedding, Zambia today enjoys consistent power supply owing to Government's transformational and workable energy mix agenda.

Last year, severe load-shedding in the country created an existential crisis for small and medium enterprises (SMEs), with outages lasting up to 20-21 hours daily due to low water levels at the Kariba Dam.

Businesses faced crippling revenue losses, high operational costs from generators, and production stoppages in manufacturing, milling and welding businesses were experienced. This resulted in production delays and broken supply chains.

Financial distress arising from increased costs for fuel and alternative energy sources, coupled with tumbling sales, shrunk profit margins for many SMEs. Job insecurities grew, threatening the viability of many small businesses.

Among others, businesses which relied on refrigeration (butchers, grocers) and daily operations like barbershops and salons were heavily affected.

But through his methodical flare and style of leadership, President Hakainde Hichilema, fixed to redeem the economy, shifted the focus to diversify the country's energy sector by integrating renewable energy. This includes solar, wind and coal-powered energy projects to build resilience.

While improvements have been reported, the sustainability of this year's energy supply stability is a top priority, coupled with ongoing monitoring of water levels in the 2026/2027 rainy season.

Prior to this development, Zesco Limited had declared last December that starting January this year, it would tremendously improve its power supply.

For Zesco corporate affairs manager Rose Sibisi, increased power generation from renewable energy is as a result of President Hichilema's initiative of solar projects being implemented by the state-owned power utility.

"Through the solar initiative, we are aiming to inject 1,000 megawatts (MW) into the national grid. This, coupled with better water management in dams, has helped normalise supply and reduce overdependence on climate-sensitive hydro power," Ms Sibisi said.

Recently, Zesco board chairperson Vickson Ncube said that through the integrated resource plan, Government targeted the country to achieve energy sufficiency, reliability and surplus: "Wheels are still turning, the pace and works are steadily progressing," Mr Ncube said.

Major projects fuelling this improvement include the 50MW Mansa Solar Plant, 200MW Chisamba Solar; phases I and II, 100MW Mailo Solar, and various solar energy projects and diversified energy sources like the Chipata West Solar 100MW project in Eastern Province which is underway.

Zesco is further upgrading transmission lines to improve regional power distribution as it is working with China Datang Corporation to deliver three solar projects this year, along with continued engagement with the Southern African Power Pool for imports.

Clearly, Government's commitment to improving power supply through Zesco via its hard-fought measures and investments has started bearing results.

Evidently, the interviews with different SMEs in townships like Kalingalinga, Mtendere and Kalikiliki in Lusaka confirm that the country is enjoying constant power supply, much to the benefit of the enterprises.

For Caesar Musonda, 49, a welder and proprietor of Soul Rebels Metal Fabrication

Company on Alick Nkhata Road in Kalingalinga, the current power supply has brought his business back to life.

His business almost collapsed last year due to dwindling customer traffic arising from perpetual load-shedding.

"My company's name stands for winning weak souls and making them strong to work for themselves. Let Government continue supplying us with stable power as it is," he said.

True to his words, Mr Musonda, who has been a welder for 25 years now, has freely been training and imparting his welding prowess to youths, including the mischievous ones, infamously known as junkies. But he almost quit transforming junkies due to load-shedding last year.

"Now my business is back to normal and I have a huge traffic of customers. In the past, I have trained about 20 junkies, both boys and girls who are now well-trained welders. They too have their own clients, they don't pay me anything, you can ask them," he said.

"But I'm not their boss. For example, currently I have 30 of them and this one, Gerald Bwalya, is making a tank stand and he will earn K10,000; everyone has their own clients here."

Mr Musonda says his company is the foundation for most of the youth doing welding business on Alick Nkhata Road. "I have the heart to change my neighbourhood with the little that I have, especially using my God-given skills and knowledge."

Grace Mapalo, 30, a salon proprietor at Mtendere 'big market', has had a different experience as regards load-shedding.

She says her salon never experienced load-shedding during the power crisis, except for her home in Lusaka's PHI. "My business has been doing well even in the times when people complained of load-shedding. I never experienced that, *kaya* [I don't know], the reason but I have had power throughout," Ms Mapalo said.

For Natalia Nkhoma, 29, specialised in fashion and design, and owner of Dezy Stitch on Watchtower road in Kalikiliki Township, load-shedding made her lay off her only employee.

But due to stable power supply her community is currently receiving, she is looking forward to recruiting another employee.

Ms Nkhoma recalls how her revenue dwindled by over 50 percent, from K6,000 to K2,500 monthly.

She is now happy with reliable power supply and hopes that the status quo will be maintained.

"I have two electric sewing machines; one industrial, a domestic and another which is manual. My main machines are electric and I hope this power

supply can be maintained," Ms Nkhoma said.

Stable electricity is more than a convenience; it is the backbone of economic resilience and social progress. If Zambia sustains this diversified energy agenda, the country can shield itself from future crises and power its growth with confidence.

Farewell to trailblazing military doctor

Chishimba Lumbwe: Former presidential physician, medical doctor, military officer

IN THE history of the Zambia Defence Force, many have served with distinction, but few have broken historical ceilings to become the only specialist officer to attain the rank of major general.

Major General (Rtd) Chishimba Mukonde Lumbwe, a distinguished medical specialist, achieved this rare feat through a career defined by medical excellence and unwavering integrity.

Dr Lumbwe, who joined the Zambia Army in 1977, rendered exceptional and dedicated service to both the Army and nation. His commitment eventually

school in Chipili District, Luapula Province, and later in Mufulira District, Copperbelt Province. He completed his secondary education at Munali Boys Secondary School before proceeding to the University of Zambia (UNZA) to study medicine.

After earning his Bachelor's degree, he trained as an officer cadet and was commissioned as a captain. He was posted to Kalewa Garrison, serving as garrison medical officer until 1982. He later served at 64 Armoured Regiment until 1983, before returning to UNZA to pursue a Master of Medicine degree.

After completing his master's degree, Dr Lumbwe rejoined the Defence Force Medical Services as a senior registrar until 1989, when he received a scholarship to study Diabetes and Endocrinology in Sheffield, UK.

OBITUARY

saw him appointed as physician to three republican presidents: David Kenneth Kaunda, Levy Patrick Mwanawasa, and Rupiah Bwezani Banda.

On Wednesday, April 8, 2026, Dr Lumbwe passed away at the age of 70. He died at St John's Hospital in Lusaka after a long illness bravely borne.

He was a fulfilled man who reached the peak of his profession while remaining a humble servant of the Zambian people. He is survived by his wife, Exildah Mwinji Lumbwe, his three children — Chansa, Bridget and Mubanga — and three grandchildren who were the delight of his later years.

Early life and education
Born on May 18, 1955, Dr Lumbwe attended primary

postgraduate studies, he lectured part time at UNZA's School of Medicine and worked at Maina Soko Military Hospital, where he rose to become consultant physician and hospital commandant.

A pioneer in public health, he co-founded the Diabetes Association of Zambia (DAZ) in 1989, expanding its reach nationwide through youth camps and clinical training. He was also instrumental in drafting Zambia's first HIV/AIDS management guidelines, advocating for positive living and ending stigma.

As chairperson of the National Food and Nutrition Commission (NFNC), he spearheaded landmark research and the salt iodisation programme that eliminated iodine deficiency

disorders (IDD) as a public health problem. He also chaired the Non Communicable Disease (NCD) Steering Committee at the Ministry of Health, overseeing the establishment of a dedicated NCD unit.

Dr Lumbwe retired in 2008 but continued his work at Mutti Kabelanga Health Service as a consultant physician —

endocrinologist/diabetologist.

Literary contributions
Beyond medicine, Dr Lumbwe was a prolific author. His works include:

- Too Young to Die — chronicling his experiences during the advent of the HIV/AIDS epidemic.
- Ukuli Nsoke Takufwa Muntu — an educational

resource explaining 63 common medical conditions in the Bemba language.

- Sundu! — A political satire that won the 2019 Ngoma Award for most outstanding book in creative writing.
- Not My Brothers' Keeper — exploring the history of slavery.
- Albert Einstein in the

Belgian Congo — a compelling piece of historical fiction that features the famed physicist within a narrative set in the Congo.

The passing of Dr Lumbwe has drawn tributes from the highest echelons of the military. Zambia Army Commander Geoffrey Zyelee, expressed profound sadness at the loss of a man

whose journey from medical specialist to military icon was truly historic.

"His role at State House reflected the high level of trust and confidence placed in his medical expertise and integrity. In recognition of his outstanding service, he was elevated to the rank of major general," Lieutenant General Zyelee said.

Beyond his professional life, Dr Lumbwe was a devoted family man. His daughter Bridget recalls: "My dad was very much a family person. He instilled discipline and excellence in serving others. Helping your fellow man was really what he believed in."

While strict with his children, he was tender with his grandchildren. "My father delighted in his grandchildren. There was a part of him that became like a child when he was with them," Bridget said.

His commitment to wellness shaped the atmosphere at home. A staunch traditionalist and diabetes advocate, he insisted on healthy eating. "We never used to eat chocolate growing up. We thought breath mints were sweets because sugary snacks were forbidden," Bridget remembered.

Outside medicine and writing, Dr Lumbwe was an avid golfer, gardener, chess player and guitarist. A lifelong Anglican, his faith deepened in later years. Only last month, he was privately confirmed by an Anglican bishop at home, a quiet spiritual milestone.

As tributes pour in from all walks of life, his family reflects on a husband and father whose public titles never overshadowed his private kindness.

Dr Lumbwe will be laid to rest today at Leopards Hill Memorial Park in Lusaka.

Infant milk scare

COMESA sounds alarm on baby milk safety

THE COMESA Competition and Consumer Commission has issued a public warning following the recall of several infant milk brands suspected to contain a harmful toxin, raising concerns over consumer safety across member states.

In a notice dated April 8, the commission said it had been

alerted to multiple product recalls involving infant formula manufactured by Nutricia Southern Africa and other brands distributed in international markets.

The affected products are suspected to contain traces of cereulide, a toxin that can cause nausea, vomiting and abdominal cramps when consumed at elevated levels.

Among the recalled products are Nutricia Aptamil Nutribiotik 2 (800g) and Aptajunior Nutribiotik 3 (800g), with a total of 2,989

units affected.

The recall was initially announced by the National Consumer Commission of South Africa following findings that a raw material used in production may have been contaminated.

The products were reportedly sold through major South African retailers including Dis-Chem and Clicks and distributed by United Pharmaceutical since August 2025.

Authorities have also confirmed that the same products were exported to Botswana and

Namibia, raising the risk of wider regional exposure.

In a separate development, the commission highlighted another recall involving Aptamil and Nursie infant milk products after an alert issued by Morocco's National Office for Food Safety. The agency warned that the affected products could cause digestive complications due to possible cereulide contamination. Moroccan authorities have since seized the products and plan to destroy them after completing the recall process.

The affected batches span multiple product variants and sizes, including Nursia, Nursie Comfort, Aptamil Premium, and Aptajunior ranges, with expiry dates stretching into 2027.

The commission further noted that these products are marketed across several COMESA member states, including Mauritius, Egypt and Tunisia, by distributors such as Danone, Ubuy, Kim-Fay and Carrefour.

Earlier this year, French multinational Danone also recalled several batches of

Aptamil and Cow & Gate infant milk products in Europe after detecting the same toxin, indicating a broader global safety concern.

The commission has since urged consumers across the COMESA region to exercise caution when purchasing infant milk products and to verify batch numbers where possible. Consumers who encounter the affected products are advised to report the matter to relevant national consumer protection authorities.

"Given the potential health risks, consumers should remain vigilant and avoid using any of the recalled products," the commission said, adding that it is working closely with member states to ensure affected consumers are informed and provided with appropriate redress.

The warning comes amid growing scrutiny over food safety standards and cross-border product monitoring, particularly for sensitive products such as infant nutrition.

Kopala 100 Summit launched

GOVERNMENT has called for strong partnerships in driving Zambia's innovation agenda as a key catalyst for economic transformation, as it launches the National Technology Business Centre (NTBC) Kopala 100 Summit.

The summit reflects the Government's unwavering commitment to advancing science, technology and innovation as key drivers of economic transformation.

Ministry of Technology and Science Permanent Secretary Brilliant Habeezu said the

Government, through the ministry, has prioritised innovation as a critical enabler.

Dr Habeezu said this during the launch of the summit on Thursday last week.

"Our focus is to build a resilient, inclusive and knowledge-based economy, one that empowers our young people, supports entrepreneurship, and creates sustainable jobs."

Dr Habeezu noted that NTBC has continued to play a central role in this agenda by fostering innovation, supporting start-ups, and facilitating technology commercialisation over the years.

Regarding the summit, he said the platform has not only

connected start-ups to investors to secure funding, expand operations and gain national recognition, but has also created real impact with local enterprises gaining regional recognition.

He added that despite these successes, the Government is mindful of the challenges that affect investment readiness.

Dr Habeezu said for this reason, the Government has provided policy directions for the implementation of its Kopala 100 2026 initiative.

Earlier, UNDP resident representative to Zambia James Wakiaga said the summit aims to bring 100 start-ups and innovators together with investors, providing

a platform for ideas to flourish, for partnerships to form, and for investments to drive Zambia's transformation.

In a speech read on his behalf by inclusive growth specialist Chali Selisho, Mr Wakiaga said the summit is intentionally designed to deepen the innovation pipeline, strengthening the full journey from ideation to commercialisation, as the UNDP has been doing through its Timbuktoo initiative.

And Finnish Ambassador to Zambia Saana Halinen said the event is meant to support the growth of Zambia as an attractive and promising place to invest for both local and international investors.

Export ban lift to boost farmers – Access Bank

ACCESS Bank Zambia says the lifting of the export ban on maize and mealie meal signals a shift towards a more liberalised agricultural trade regime aimed at boosting farmer incomes and enhancing regional market access.

On Thursday, Government removed restrictions on the export of maize grain and related products, including mealie meal.

According to the bank's latest Market Watch report, the move is expected to improve earnings for producers and ease domestic oversupply pressures, but may also raise concerns over short-term food price stability and local supply adequacy.

"The policy reflects a balancing act between supporting agricultural competitiveness and safeguarding food security, with authorities relying on existing grain reserves and regulated export permits to manage risks," the report states.

The bank notes that Zambia's recent policy and financing developments point to continued efforts towards macroeconomic stabilisation and external re-engagement, although fiscal

and debt dynamics remain vulnerable to global commodity and energy price volatility.

It adds that rising oil prices linked to tensions in the Middle East pose a key near-term risk, particularly given Zambia's dependence on imports.

However, these risks are partly offset by stronger copper-related inflows, which continue to support the country's balance of payments.

More broadly, the report indicates that the economy remains sensitive to shifts in global risk sentiment, warning that sustained inflationary pressures could complicate monetary easing and keep local financing conditions tight.

"At the same time, ongoing engagement with creditors and reform momentum remain central to improving market confidence and supporting medium-term debt sustainability," the report adds.

On the currency market, the Kwacha closed Thursday at K19.23 against the US dollar, according to Bloomberg data, continuing to trade around its 50-day moving average of K19.3106.

The bank further notes that global sentiment remains generally positive despite heightened geopolitical risks,

adding that provisional tax payment deadlines could support the local unit in the short term.

"Therefore, we expect the Kwacha to close the week on a relatively strong footing, although softer copper prices may limit its upside due to terms-of-trade pressures," the report states.


Meanwhile, the Bank of Zambia recorded strong investor demand at its latest treasury bill auction, which was oversubscribed.

Bids reached approximately K2.6 billion against an offer of K2.2 billion, with the central bank maintaining its borrowing target at K2.2 billion.

According to results for Treasury Bill Tender No. 07/2026 held on April 2, the 91-day bill attracted K823.6 million in bids against an offer of K440 million, with K712.42 million accepted.

The 182-day bill recorded lower demand, receiving K310 million in bids against an offer of K500 million.

For the 273-day tenor, K603 million was bid against K530 million on offer, with K552 million accepted, while the 364-day bill attracted K845 million in bids against an offer of K730 million, with K648 million taken up.

Kabuswe tables Minerals Regulation Bill

LUSAKA – Minister of Mines and Minerals Development Paul Kabuswe has presented the Minerals Regulation Commission (Amendment) Bill Number 32 of 2026 before Parliament.

The bill seeks to revise the composition of the board of the Minerals Regulation Commission and provide for matters connected with or incidental to the Act.

Following its introduction, the bill was read for the first time in Parliament, as an initial procedural step that formally places it before the House.

It has since been referred to the Committee on

National Economy, Trade and Labour Matters for further consideration.

The committee is expected to examine the content of the bill and submit its report to Parliament in due course.

As part of this process, Members of Parliament have been encouraged to make submissions in line with the committee's programme of work.

The proposed amendments signal a positive step towards having a board that will enhance the operations of the commission, such as issuance of mining rights licences. **TRYNESS TEMBO**

Zambia on track – Kabeta

MINISTRY of Mines and Minerals Development Permanent Secretary Hapenga Kabeta says Zambia is on course to reach the ambitious one million tonnes copper production target, following record output and sustained sector reforms.

Dr Kabeta said preliminary data indicates strong momentum in the mining industry, with copper production reaching an all-time high of about 891,000 tonnes at the close of 2025.

He said the achievement marks a significant milestone for the country and reflects the impact of ongoing reforms and enhanced collaboration between Government and the private sector.

Dr Kabeta was speaking during a Public-Private Dialogue (PPD) Mining Technical Working Group (TWG), which he described as a productive platform that has enabled open and honest engagement on issues affecting the mining industry.

He said the forum has allowed stakeholders to address challenges transparently and work towards improving the operating environment in the sector.

He cited the enactment of the Minerals Regulation Commission Act at the end of 2024 and the Geological and Mineral Development Act in early 2025 as key milestones.

LuSE turnover rises 7 percent

Sustained growth highlights LuSE's commitment to advancing financial inclusion

THE Lusaka Securities Exchange (LuSE) recorded a total market turnover of K64.3 million last month, representing a seven percent increase from February. During the period under review, several stocks posted notable gains. AECI edged up from K129.67 to K129.88, while Airtel Networks Zambia surged from K139.31 to K175.00. ZCCM-IH rose from K166.82 to K170.00, Zambia Forestry and Forest Industries Corporation climbed from K4.50 to K5.00, and Zambia Sugar advanced from K72.80 to

K74.98 per share. LuSE chief executive officer Nicholas Kabaso said, however, that some counters recorded marginal declines. Bata closed at K8.39 from K8.50, BATZ fell from K14.37 to K12.99, while Copperbelt Energy Corporation (CEC) dropped from K18.44 to K17.92. Chilanga Cement also declined from K80.50 to K77.60. Other laggards included Puma, which fell to K2.50 from K3.00, Standard Chartered Bank Zambia, which dropped to K1.30 from K1.97, and Zambeef Products, which declined from K2.14 to K1.25. Metal Fabricators of Zambia decreased to K55.00 from K59.39, while Zanaco eased to K9.74 from K9.89.

REIZ Real Estate Investment Trust remained unchanged at US\$0.09 per share. "This divergence between price appreciation and turnover suggests that gains were driven primarily by selective demand in key securities rather than broad-based market activity," Mr Kabaso said in the March market performance statement. He added that retail participation through the LuSE Mobile App remained strong, with registered users rising to 36,058, representing a nine percent month-on-month increase. Mr Kabaso said the sustained growth highlights LuSE's commitment to advancing financial inclusion, with the mobile platform enabling seamless account access,

real-time market data, and convenient trading. He noted that the platform continues to attract younger and first-time investors, broadening participation beyond traditional institutional and high-net-worth segments. In the fixed-income segment, secondary market activity also strengthened, with total bond turnover rising to K6.5 billion in March from K5.7 billion in February. On a year-to-date basis, the market delivered a solid first-quarter performance, recording gains of 5.30 percent in local currency terms and 20.74 percent in US dollar terms, reinforcing LuSE's appeal as a frontier market for both domestic and international investors.

Mr Kabaso said March also saw continued capital appreciation, with the Lusaka All Share Index closing at 27,289.81 points, up one percent from the previous month. "March was a landmark month for LuSE, highlighted by the debut listing of Klaption Reinsurance via introduction," he said. The company commenced trading with 2.82 billion ordinary shares at K0.35 per share, representing 25 percent of its issued share capital. "Notably, Klaption Re becomes the first Moody's-rated entity to list on the LuSE Main Board, marking a significant milestone in enhancing market credibility and investor confidence," Mr

Kabaso said. He added that the development follows the recent listing of DotCom Zambia in December, signalling renewed listing momentum on the exchange. As at monthend, total market capitalisation stood at approximately K341.9 billion (about US\$17 billion). Looking ahead, Mr Kabaso said the outlook for both equity and fixed-income markets remains positive, supported by sustained capital appreciation, rising retail participation, and improving market turnover. "These trends position LuSE for continued growth and reinforce its role as a key platform for capital formation and investment in the region," he said.

Chirundu dams restocked with fingerlings

THE Department of Fisheries in Chirundu District in Southern Province has stocked the Machavika and Siankapu dams with over 14,000 fish fingerlings. Speaking after the stocking exercise, Chirundu District Commissioner Patrick Kasambila said the stocking exercise was in line with the Eighth National Development Plan (8NDP), which aims to promote, among other things, economic diversification.

"This is in line with the Eighth National Development Plan, which aims to promote economic diversification, aquaculture and fisheries value chain as a contributor to the country's gross domestic product. This act will greatly reduce malnutrition and poverty among the local communities through fish farming and improved access to high protein at the doorstep," Mr Kasambila said. He added the Zambian government is committed to seeing its citizens, especially children,

have access to good nutrition. Chirundu Town Council chairperson Nevers Muchindu called upon the traditional leadership as well as the residents to guard the fish fingerlings jealously. Chief Chipepo, who spoke through his representative, Emmanuel Dyalolo, cautioned residents against using mosquito nets and other illegal fishing gear once the go-ahead to start fishing has been given. "Anyone found wanting will face stiff punishment according to the guidelines that have been laid

down," he said. Chirundu district fisheries and livestock coordinator Lloyd Mweemba said the intention of Government is to take development to the people. This has been manifested through the fish fingerlings that will provide protein to the communities. Mr Mweemba said the residents will start fishing in March 2027. Fishing will be through a hook and line and not nets so as to avoid

depleting the fish in the dams and to enable every member of the community to have access to the resource. "The catches from the fishing will not be for sale but consumption for the local residents," he further said. A resident of Machavika village, Bridget Siamanenga, who is also a committee member of Machavika Dam, welcomed the stocking of fish fingerlings in her area. "The stocking of these

dams will elevate the livelihoods of members in the community as they will have access to food in form of fish," Ms Siamanenga added. She said as a committee, they have the mandate to pass on the guidelines to the members of the community that may not be aware of the guidelines so that the fish can be well protected. The dams have been stocked with mixed sex fish fingerlings of the oreochromis niloticus species, commonly referred to as the bream, and have been locally procured from Chirundu Bream Farms.

Copperbelt FISP farmers verified

OVER 99 percent of targeted beneficiaries under the Farmer Input Support Programme (FISP) were successfully verified for the 2025/2026 farming season in Copperbelt Province. Speaking during a FISP review meeting held in Masaiti District, provincial agriculture coordinator Sekanayo Ng'ambi revealed that out of 93,688 targeted farmers, 93,462 were positively verified using the electronic Know Your Customer (e-KYC) system.

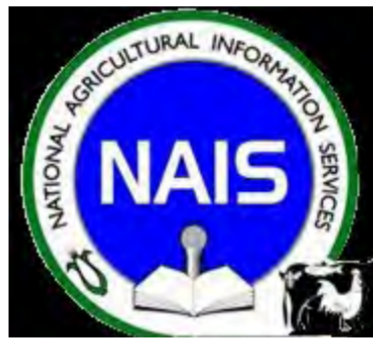
She said the province had 61,952 farmers who met Food Reserve Agency (FRA) bonding requirement before it was waived off. She explained that the programme is aimed at improving household food security and increasing incomes among small-scale farmers, and it was implemented across all 10 districts in the province using the e-voucher system. Ms Ng'ambi noted that the e-voucher system significantly improved efficiency, particularly in targeting beneficiaries and reducing the presence of ghost farmers. "The system also shortened the time farmers take to access inputs, while

allowing extension officers to focus more on advisory services," she said. She said despite these achievements, the province recorded several operational challenges. Among them were issues related to pre-tagging of farmers, which led to the inclusion of inactive beneficiaries, and difficulties in replacing ineligible farmers before the closure of the programme. Ms Ng'ambi explained that some farmers failed to redeem inputs due to loss of registered phone numbers or use of different numbers when transacting with the Food Reserve Agency (FRA), making verification difficult. She said the agro-dealers that

participated in the programme were well equipped with inputs and farmers were able to get all the inputs they wanted on time. Meanwhile, senior marketing development officer Alick Chirwa emphasised the importance of strengthening monitoring systems and improving coordination among stakeholders to ensure the programme achieves its intended objectives. Mr Chirwa emphasised the need to enhance sensitisation of farmers and community leaders, improved

responsiveness from ICT support teams, and increased monitoring at camp level to curb manipulation of the system. He further encouraged the need to restricting pre-tagging to approved beneficiary lists, empowering district officers to remove ineligible farmers, and improving coordination in the distribution of redemption codes. "FISP remains a key government initiative aimed at supporting small-scale farmers through subsidised agricultural inputs, thereby contributing to national food

security and rural livelihoods," Mr Chirwa said. He said the province has already started data cleaning by ensuring that farmers have correct NRCs, phone numbers and correct names in the system, and the consolidated list will be submitted to the headquarters and Food Reserve Agency. Mr Chirwa said the ZIAMIS system has been enhanced to enable FRA to access the system so that even farmers who will supply FRA will be paid through their mobile numbers. "FISP is starting early, by July, and farmers should be ready as well," Mr Chirwa stated.



Extension services key in boosting farm productivity

KATETE district agricultural coordinator Kabange Masenga reiterated the importance of knowledge dissemination and farmer participation in extension activities during a field day. 2. The 1st Defendant is and was at all material times a Shareholder, Director, Servant, Agent and/or employee of the 2nd Defendant and acted within the scope of his authority in all matters complained of herein.
3. The 2nd Defendant is and was at all material times a company duly incorporated under the provisions of the Companies Act No. 10 of 2017 of the Laws of Zambia, carrying on business, inter alia, in the importation and sale of motor vehicles.
4. On or about 22nd February 2025, the Plaintiff entered into a valid and binding written contract with the Defendants for the purchase of a Honda Fit motor vehicle at an agreed purchase price of US\$ 2,860, being the equivalent of ZMW 147,071.00 calculated at the agreed exchange rate of ZMW 26 to US\$ 1.
5. The express and/or implied terms of the said Contract included, inter alia, that:
 - a. The Plaintiff would pay a down payment as agreed by the parties;
 - b. The balance of the purchase price would be payable in instalments as agreed;
 - c. The Defendants would procure, import and deliver the said motor vehicle to the Plaintiff;
 - d. Delivery of the motor vehicle would be effected within thirteen (13) weeks from the date of execution of the Contract.
6. In compliance with the terms of the Contract, the Plaintiff duly paid the agreed down payment in two instalments as follows:
 - a. ZMW 35,000.00 paid on 24th February 2025; and
 - b. ZMW 9,000.00 paid on 26th March 2025.
 bringing the total down payment to ZMW 44,000.00.
7. The Plaintiff has at all material times been ready, willing, and able to perform his remaining obligations under the Contract.
8. The Plaintiff will aver at trial that delivery of the motor vehicle within thirteen (13) weeks was an express and fundamental term of the Contract, time being of the essence.

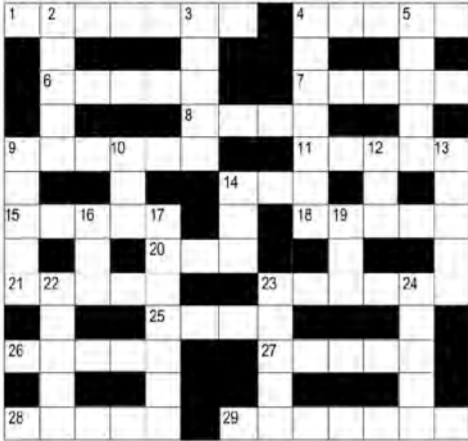

ASFAR strike key blow in all-Moroccan semi-final

RABAT - ASFAR have struck a key blow in their all-Moroccan CAF Champions League semi-final, defeating RS Berkane 2-0 in the first leg, held at Prince Moulay Abdellah Stadium in Rabat on Saturday night.

The Royal Armed Forces club, nicknamed Al Zaem, struck twice in the second half via Ahmed Hammoudane and Khalid Ait Ouarkhane to put themselves well on course for a return to the final for the first time since their only continental championship way back in 1985.

A tense opening quarter saw the teams exchange attacking moments, without any clear chances created at either end.

ASFAR had an appeal for a penalty in the 26th minute when winger Ahmed Hammoudane tumbled in the 18-yard area, but the referee opted against awarding a spot kick, and his decision was validated by television replays.

In the 33rd minute, the hosts created space for Nolan

Mbamba to fire a low drive on target from the left of the penalty area, but Berkane goalkeeper Anas Zniti made a relatively comfortable save.

The Royal Armed Forces side enjoyed a couple more promising moments, but the half closed with the score still locked at 0-0.

ASFAR continued to push through the early stages of the second half, and they found the back of the net shortly before the hour mark, with Hammoudane capitalising on a loose ball after Youssef El Fahli had been denied by Zniti, firing home a left-footed shot for 1-0.

Berkane responded well to going behind and built up a strong sense of attacking pressure, but that was punctured in the 80th minute when a ball fell kindly for Khalid Ait Ouarkhane on the edge of the penalty area, and he emphatically struck home a low drive to see the hosts 2-0 up.

Al Zaem had further chances to add to their

advantage, but also had to weather a late storm from the Oranges, who pushed hard to secure a vital away goal but were ultimately left frustrated in their attempts.

The return game will be held at Berkane Municipal Stadium on Saturday evening.

The aggregate winners will advance to the final to face either Mamelodi Sundowns or Esperance de Tunis.

And in what was a tightly contested CAF Confederation Cup, USM Alger and OC Safi played to a tense 0-0 draw in their first-leg, semi-final clash at Stade du Juliet on Saturday night.

It was all USM Alger during the opening exchanges of the match as they often exploited gaps in Safi's backline, particularly on either side of the 18-yard area.

Safi appeared to struggle under the home side's pressure and often found themselves on the back foot early on.

'Ngumoha's impact no surprise'

Liverpool earn vital win ahead of Champions League clash against PSG

LIVERPOOL - Arne Slot said Rio Ngumoha is ready to be thrown into any situation after scoring his first Anfield goal in a 2-0 win over Fulham on Saturday, which eased the rising pressure on the Liverpool boss.

The 17-year-old had already

netted his first Premier League goal with a late winner away at Newcastle in Liverpool's second game of the season.

Despite a difficult campaign, Slot has largely resisted the clamour to rely on Ngumoha as a game-changer.

But he has started three of Liverpool's last eight games, with Slot encouraged by his physical development and

more end product.

That faith was rewarded as Ngumoha produced a sublime strike to become Liverpool's youngest-ever Premier League goalscorer at Anfield.

Mohamed Salah then netted in his first home appearance since announcing he will leave at the end of the season as Liverpool snapped a three-game losing streak.

"He has such a special quality which you don't see a lot in football anymore, dominating the one v one situation and that's exactly what he did when he scored his goal," said Slot on Ngumoha's impact.

"I've said a few weeks ago that his playing time will increase because he got stronger and stronger, showed

more and more when he came in (to games), but also in training sessions.

"That it wasn't only a nice trick, but there was more and more end product to what he did.

"There was more and more power, which is needed if you play against the best defenders in the world and I don't think anyone is surprised that, at this

moment in time, he scored his first goal (at Anfield)."

Liverpool face a much stiffer test tomorrow if they are to overcome a 2-0 first-leg deficit against holders Paris Saint-Germain (PSG) in the Champions League.

Slot, though, believes Ngumoha is ready for that elite level, even if he is unsure whether the teenager will be

fresh enough to start.

"I think he's ready. The question, of course, is can he do this two days later again?" Slot added.

"In the beginning of the season, he was a young player, getting some experience with the first team, but now he's just someone I can pick for any game. So also the one on Tuesday." AFP

Milan's title hopes in tatters

BERGAMO - AC Milan relinquished any remaining hope of winning the Serie A title on Saturday after falling to a shock 3-0 home defeat by Udinese, while Juventus beat Atalanta 1-0 to move into the Champions League positions.

A Davide Baresaghi own goal and Jurgen Ekkelenkamp's glancing header in the first half, and Arthur Atta's superb low finish in the 71st minute, left Milan nine points behind Inter Milan ahead of the league leaders' clash at Como last night.

With six matches remaining in their season, even an Inter loss at Como would leave third-placed Milan with a near-impossible gap to close.

And a Como win would not be good news either as the lakeside outfit currently sit fifth and five points behind Milan, who have lost three of four matches since winning last month's Milan derby, after Juventus moved provisionally fourth.

Jeremie Boga bundled home the only goal in an uneventful match in Bergamo, the day after coach Luciano Spalletti - hired with the aim of getting Juve into the Champions League - signed a new deal with the Turin club until 2028.

Milan host Juventus in a fortnight, a match which looks likely to be key to the top-four positions come May, and Allegri described as "right" the loud whistles which accompanied the end of the game at the San Siro.

"This defeat should make us understand that our qualification for the Champions League

is under threat," Milan coach Massimiliano Allegri said.

Udinese moved into the top half of the table after an impressive away performance in which Nicolo Zaniolo, who was the rising star of Italian football before suffering two serious knee injuries in 2020, was the standout player.

Zaniolo has had a difficult time since being dumped by Roma in 2023, and he was not selected for the Italy squad, which recently missed out on a third straight World Cup.

But the 26-year-old has found a home at Udinese and he was key to Baresaghi's own goal in the 27th minute, as the attacker charged upfield on the counter-attack before offloading to Atta, whose cross was deflected into the Milan net.

Ten minutes later, Zaniolo whipped in a beautiful, inch-perfect cross for Ekkelenkamp to double the away side's lead and spark rumblings of discontent in the San Siro stands.

Milan pushed up on Udinese after the break, when Allegri brought on burly centre forward Niclas Fullkrug, and Alexis Saelmaeckers could barely believe it when Maduka Okoye palmed his half-volley onto the crossbar in the 51st minute.

Atta sealed the points for Udinese 20 minutes later when he was allowed to burst towards goal and roll a sneaky low shot in at Mike Maignan's near post.

The discontent was clear when boos met Rafael Leao's substitution soon afterwards, and those who were still in the seats at the end made their feelings known at the final whistle. AFP

Ex-striker eager to make impact in video analyst role

FOR many footballers, the final whistle of their playing career signals a move to the dugout.

Coaching has long been the common path for several retired players.

Rather than following the usual route, former striker Lineker Mwikisa has become a match analyst specialist.

He is currently under-17 girls national team video analyst.

Mwikisa is responsible for studying match footage, analysing opponents' tactics, assessing player performance and providing actionable insights to coaches and players.

His work helps the coaching team make informed decisions on strategy, training focus and player development.

Born and raised in Choma, Mwikisa's life has always revolved around football.

He attended Shampane Basic School and completed his Grade 12 at Namwianga Christian Secondary School.

Football was never a hobby; it was part of his upbringing.

His biggest inspiration was his father, Fain Mwikisa, a respected football administrator.

In the early 2000s, Mwikisa's father was Football Association of Zambia spokesperson.

Growing up in that environment meant that Mwikisa was constantly surrounded by discussions about the game.

"I grew up with football around me. It shaped the way I understood the game from a very young age," he recalls.

While many players only think about life after football when retirement approaches, Mwikisa began preparing early.

While still playing abroad, he enrolled at the Swiss School of Business and Management, where he pursued a Bachelor's degree in business administration in sports management.

Balancing football and academics was far from easy.

"After training, I would be very tired but I still had assignments and exams to prepare for," Mwikisa recalled.

"It was challenging but my desire to change football management kept me going."

His playing career, however, took an unexpected turn while he was in Oman.

A knee injury revealed a complete tear of his anterior cruciate ligament (ACL). After undergoing surgery at Linksfield Hospital, Mwikisa faced a difficult decision.

Already in his late 30s, he realised that returning to the pitch for just a few more years could risk further injury.

Instead, he chose to retire and fully pursue his vision of football management.

Today, Mwikisa believes the future of the game lies in modern and professional administration.

He points to several gaps in Zambian football, including the need for stronger youth development systems, data analytics, performance analysis and professional expertise

such as nutritionists and sports psychologists.

"Football today is driven by data and innovation. Clubs must evolve and also learn to generate their own revenue rather than relying only on sponsors," Mwikisa said.

His experience working with Zambia's women's national teams, including the under-17 side that has qualified for back-to-back FIFA World Cups, has further broadened his outlook.

Exposure to global tournaments and professional systems has strengthened his desire to bring best practices back to the local game.

For Mwikisa, one principle stands above all — the player must always come first.

"The biggest stakeholder in football is the player. If player welfare is prioritised, performance will naturally improve," he said.

He believes that too often, clubs focus on short-term results at the expense of players' development and well-being.

"Investing in players means more than just training on the field. It includes proper nutrition, mental health support and guidance on career progression. When these elements are in place, players not only perform better but also stay motivated and committed to the game."

Mwikisa also emphasises the role of analysis in shaping a player-centred approach.

By studying performance data and match footage, coaches can tailor training to suit individual strengths and weaknesses.

"Video analysis isn't just about tactics, it's a tool to help each player reach their full potential, ensuring that decisions on the pitch benefit them as much as the team," Mwikisa said.

A holder of a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration in Sports Management from the Swiss School of Business and Management (SSBM) in Geneva, Switzerland, Mwikisa said education is the best equaliser.

"Without it, life after football becomes very difficult," he said.

As he looks ahead, Mwikisa hopes to play an influential role in football administration, where his ideas can drive meaningful change.

His journey proves that the future of football is not only shaped on the pitch but also in boardrooms where the game's direction is decided.

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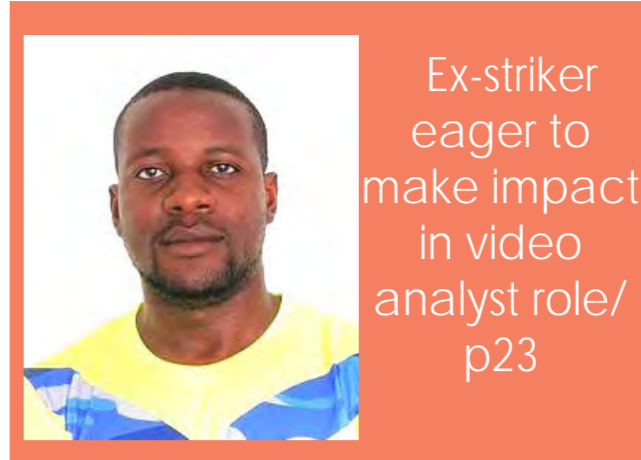

'Football requires strategic planning, investment'

GOVERNMENT is committed to supporting football development with emphasis on infrastructure investment, unity and enhanced stakeholder participation. Minister of Information and Media Cornelius Mweetwa said football has evolved into a business that requires strategic planning and investment to thrive. Speaking yesterday during the Football Association of Zambia (FAZ) Southern Province annual general meeting in Choma, Mweetwa commended the Keith Mweemba-led executive for fostering unity, saying it aligns with President Hakainde Hichilema's vision of collaborative development. "We congratulate you on the unity of purpose. This is in line with what President Hichilema desires that things should be done in an inclusive and coordinated manner," Mweetwa said. He said Government is aware that the development of football and other sports hinges on infrastructure investment. "Young players need proper infrastructure to learn and grow. Without it, it is impossible to produce quality sportsmen and women," Mweetwa said. He also urged FAZ structures, especially at provincial level, to engage local authorities and take advantage of the Constituency Development Fund (CDF). "I want to encourage FAZ Southern Province and other provinces to work with councils and consider allocating CDF

towards sinking boreholes at sports fields, especially in schools to make them user-friendly," Mweetwa said. He said sport holds a special place in his life, recalling his time as a sports secretary at the University of Zambia (UNZA). Mweetwa said as the economy rebounds, Government will intensify efforts to invest in sports infrastructure. He also praised Southern Province for its consistent success at youth level, citing

achievements in grassroots competitions. Mweetwa, however, challenged football administrators to address why the province's talented youths are not transitioning to the senior national team. "Southern Province has excelled at youth level for many years, but we must ask, why are these players not being maintained and progressing into the national team? This question must be answered," he said. Mweetwa said Government

is ready to support football, emphasising its role in keeping young people away from vices that could spoil their future and creating employment opportunities. He cited Zambia's recent international engagements, including facing world champions Argentina in a friendly in Buenos Aires, which ended 5-0 in favour of the hosts. "That match was not just about winning but exposure. It reminded the world that Zambia exists, a country with attractions

like Victoria Falls. For me, the confidence displayed by our team was a victory," Mweetwa said. And FAZ president Keith Mweemba called for an end to "camps" and divisions. Mweemba said football can only grow where there is peace and genuine love, rather than hatred or "us versus them" attitudes. He encouraged members to come forward and speak openly instead of creating division. "Football thrives where there is harmony, peace and love. It cannot grow where there is acrimony, hatred and division. We said there should be no camps as they serve no purpose," Mweemba said. "Let us reject the notion of 'us versus them' and instead embrace inclusivity and mutual respect." He also challenged the FAZ Southern Province leadership to work hard and increase the number of men's teams in the Super League. Currently, Green Eagles and Maestro United Zambia are campaigning in the spotlight. Mweemba also told the gathering that FAZ has a K7 million debt owed to referees in the lower divisions. He said he does not want to engage in "blame games". FAZ Southern Province chairperson Nicholas Moomba said their mission is talent identification and nurturing young players through various age categories, ranging from under-7 to under-19. Moomba said lower divisions should be dedicated solely to player development. He cautioned against age-cheating to win matches.

Man City thrash Chelsea

Pep Guardiola's City had been sloppy during the first half, with the brilliant Rayan Cherkhi striking a first-time effort from the edge of the box straight at Robert Sanchez and Antoine Semenyo's shot from a similar position deflecting wide. But the visitors started the second period with more purpose and broke the deadlock in the 50th minute when Cherkhi stood up a teasing cross which Nico O'Reilly powerfully headed in. Frenchman Cherkhi was the provider again just six minutes later, feeding a pass through to former Chelsea player Marc Guehi, who caressed a low finish into the far corner to spark wild celebrations in front of the away end. **BBC**

Sinner wins Monte Carlo Masters

MONACO - Jannik Sinner yesterday returned to top spot in the world for the first time since early November after a 7-6 (7-5), 6-3 Monte Carlo Masters final victory over defending champion and world number one Carlos Alcaraz. The Monaco decider was the first meeting of the top two in the world since Sinner won in straight sets in the final of the ATP Championship last November. In a tense and tight match with plenty of big shots, both players struggled with the windy conditions, which added an element of unpredictability to proceedings and led to 83 unforced errors between the pair. The win gives the 24-year-old Italian his third Masters 1000 title of the year, having already triumphed at Indian Wells and Miami, and extends his winning run in Masters series events to 22 matches. Having this trophy and getting back to number one means a lot to me. Today was a very high level from both of us. It was a bit breezy and different conditions to what we had played in this week," he said **BBC**
